From the Desk of Rabbi Peter Rigler

During Rosh Hashanah I spoke about how essential it is for us to maintain a relationship with Israel. This is a moment to act! If you care about the Reform Movement in Israel, if you support egalitarian prayer, if you believe in freedom of religion, the right of Reform rabbis to conduct marriage, divorce, burial and conversion, if you believe that women should have equal status, here is your chance to make a difference. I want to encourage you to Join the ARZENU Reform Zionist group and vote in the World Zionist Congress elections. This is the best way for us to directly influence and impact the future of the Reform Movement in Israel and of the Jewish people around the globe.

Established in 1897, the World Zionist Organization (WZO) is often called the "Parliament of the Jewish people." It was convened by Theodor Herzl in Basel and its goal was to unite the Jewish people and bring about the establishment of the Jewish state.

Every five years the WZO convenes a Congress whose representation is determined by democratic elections amongst the international Zionist political parties. Between congresses the Zionist General Council (the Vaad Hapoel) convenes annually for discussions on pressing matters on the agenda of the Jewish people. Participation in one election is effective for five full years!

The next World Zionist Organization elections will be held worldwide in 2015. Israeli citizens are represented in the elections through political parties in Israel; world Jews are represented through international Zionist political parties to which they belong.



Out of 30 countries represented in the WZO, the Reform Movement has constituent ARZENU organizations in 14 countries. ARZENU is the umbrella organization for all Reform Zionist organizations worldwide.



As with the Israel Knesset elections, whoever wins the most votes receives the most important positions and control of budgets, and so it is with the World Zionist Congress elections.

Simply put: whoever has the largest number of representatives in Congress will set goals and have access to the centers of power and money.

For example: On behalf of the Reform Movement in Israel ARZENU uses its power to impact the Jewish Agency budget allocation for religious streams: ARZENU tries to prevent or limit the size of budget cuts to the streams and has largely been successful.

Every 5 years an election is held within each country to determine the composition of the delegates. If you participate in this process, and vote for your ARZENU constituent organization, you make an immediate difference to the future of the Reform Movement.

Towards the beginning of 2015 - all international Zionist political parties will go to the polls. According to the results obtained in these elections each Zionist political party will receive its allocation of delegates to the Congress.

The goal this time is to significantly increase our representation and in order to achieve this we need everyone who participated in the past to do so again and to encourage even more people to register and vote this time.

Anyone who is Jewish, is over the age of 18 and who signs the "Jerusalem Program. will be able to vote"

ESSENTIALS OF MUSIC THEORY

BOARD GREETINGS

With Thanksgiving as the next holiday on the horizon, I thought it would be interesting to review the perspectives of how our religion views the holiday. It is clear that the Rabbinical Assembly does not view Thanksgiving, a secular American holiday; as having the status of a traditional Jewish holiday, however most American rabbis see the freedoms that we have in America as something for which we should be thankful. Another perspective indicated that the origins of Thanksgiving were from Christians who wanted to imitate the Jewish festival of *Sukkot*, so from that perspective there are some Jewish concepts behind it. A third perspective was quite simple - Jewish people like to celebrate and Thanksgiving is a reason for a gathering with family, friends, food and drink!

Kidding aside, we know that giving thanks is very important in Judaism. Therefore, the real question then is: "How should we as Jews show thanks?" Traditionally, Jews show thanks through Jewish rituals which are both spiritual and educational. Typically, you will find the following rituals at each Thanksgiving:

- ➤ Blessing the food before the meal and saying *Birchot HaMazon*, grace after meals.
- Each person at the table has the opportunity to share the things for which he/she is thankful.
- ➤ A Thanksgiving prayer is recited.
- The Thanksgiving meal is served (*shulchan aruch*).

According to Rabbi Tuly Weisz of Israel 365, there is a deep connection between the early Americans and the Bible not often recognized. In his article dated September 19, 2013, he states that "Every American Kindergartner knows the story of the Pilgrims on the Mayflower who landed at Plymouth Rock in 1620 and gave thanks for their success and accomplishments." What most people don't know, however, was just how unique those Pilgrims were. Unlike any other group before them, the Pilgrims were fleeing from religious oppression in Europe and looked to the Bible for inspiration. They saw themselves as the chosen people fleeing from a brutal King (James I), who they referred to as Pharaoh, casting off the yolk of bondage and oppression. They referred to their voyage on the Mayflower as passing through the Red Sea into the wilderness. For inspiration, they looked to Exodus and even studied Hebrew in order to read it in the original. When they arrived in what they referred to as the "Promised

With Thanksgiving as the next holiday on the horizon, Land," they offered thanks and prayers to God, like I thought it would be interesting to review the the biblical Feast of Tabernacles.

No other group in history had ever felt that they were reenacting and fulfilling the Bible like America's first settlers. For centuries, European explorers had set sail for new lands without referring to the Bible, seeing themselves as God's chosen people or looking for the Promised Land. This remarkable fact was never inevitable and should not be taken for granted. Furthermore, the early Americans who looked towards the Biblical narrative for inspiration, doesn't end with the first Thanksgiving. In fact, that's only where it begins.

At the first presidential inauguration in 1789, George Washington held up the procedures until a Bible was found, insisting upon swearing his oath of office upon it, a tradition that has continued to this day. Every American president has referred to the Hebrew Bible in his inauguration address, comparing his generation to the Israelites in the wilderness, confronted with challenges, yet on the verge of the Promised Land. British Chief Rabbi Jonathan Sacks has pointed out that what is interesting is that not only does every American president look to the Biblical narrative for inspiration, but America is the only country in the world where this occurs!

The Jewish people have always claimed to have a special mission to promote the universal values of peace, freedom and hope, but unfortunately, for the last 2,000 years no one was listening. From its inception, however, America was different. Despite pockets of anti-Semitism, there has always been a deep and distinct appreciation for the Jewish people in the United States. The "American Dream" was built upon a Biblical foundation and we repeatedly refer to America's "Judeo-Christian values," which is one of the principle reasons for America's strong support for the State of Israel.

Even now, Rabbi Weisz lives in Israel with his family and they continue to celebrate Thanksgiving, because it is the day that celebrates a proud fact, that the lessons from our Torah have been ingrained into the American soul from its very inception. As a Jew, he is thankful that when America was discovered, America discovered the Bible.

This holiday, create some rituals and connections of your own for you and your family to treasure over the years to come. From my family to yours and on behalf of the Board of Temple Sholom, Happy Thanksgiving!

FAMILY MANAGEMENT CENTER DINNER AT TEMPLE SHOLOM

Our Third Annual Women's Shelter Dinner was another wonderful event held at Temple Sholom. It wouldn't have been such a success without the help of all those who contributed their time and the overflow of donations. A huge hand goes out to Tim Habbart, who ran the kitchen, and fed over 70 people. We had so much food that we were able to package food for other shelter members who were unable to attend and also made a delivery to the Life Center on 63rd Street. Eleven heavy bags of goods were packaged for each mother to take home with them. There were so many donations, that we were able to help restock the shelters' shelves with baby goods, towels, blankets, and school supplies. Everyone pulled together and created such a warm and friendly environment for our guests, that by the end of the evening you weren't able to tell who wasn't a congregant - especially at the craft table where Rachel Thomas kept the children well entertained. A heart felt and well deserved todah rabah - goes out to all of you who made this evening a tremendous success - we couldn't have done it without you!













Here is Adam's note of appreciation to all who helped:

Last night was a tremendous success. There definitely were bumps along the way, as should be expected when 25+ volunteers pull together in the short time span we had to put on a meal for roughly 70 people. Some of you may question whether your role made a difference. We say, emphatically, yes. How do I know? I offer the following as proof:

About two-thirds through the meal, the Rabbi pulled Robin and me aside to tell us he overheard a boy from the shelter talking to his mother about the night. In speaking of the dinner, the dessert, the arts and crafts and people, he told her that it was "nicest place we've ever been" and asked if "we can come here every week." On another note, Antoinette, the FMC coordinator, said to me how truly grateful the shelter is for the hundreds of pounds of donations we provided (she gave me just one example of the huge impact our contribution will make: some you may have met the mother with four children who ate with us - she literally showed up to the shelter with nothing more than a small suitcase and the clothes on their backs).

I don't know, but if you ask me whether our collaborative effort to host our guests for a meal for just a few short hours made a difference, I suggest to you that the answer is undeniably yes.




November B'nai Mitzvah


