From the Desk of Rabbi Rigler



"As the only Reform congregation in Delaware County, Pennsylvania, we welcome you to our warm, vibrant and inclusive family."

These words appear on the home page of our website and they are words that make us proud! It's only recently that other synagogues in the Philadelphia area have begun changing their policies and practices to become more

welcoming to interfaith Jewish families. Some local clergy are, for the first time, officiating at interfaith marriages. In June, a local Conservative synagogue broke with the long standing policy of the Conservative movement when it passed a constitutional amendment extending full membership to families in which only one of the adults is Jewish. I applaud their efforts.

Temple Sholom has a long history of embracing inclusiveness. Many years ago Rabbi Mayer Selekman and Cantor Patrice Kaplan took what was then the bold step of participating in interfaith marriages. Under their guidance, Temple Sholom became a warm and welcoming place for all families looking to bring Judaism into their lives. These are not just hollow words; they are a commitment that unites our entire congregation. I came to Temple Sholom in part because of this incredibly warm and welcoming attitude. I am so blessed to be part of the courageous decisions of the clergy that preceded me! On our *bimah* during special occasions, non-Jewish family members are invited to fully participate. Non-Jewish family members serve on many of our committees and help to make Temple Sholom a very special place. On Friday night **November 4**th, we will be celebrating our Interfaith families with partnership from Interfaithways, a local organization that offers resources and support to interfaith families. I invite you to join us that night as we acknowledge the interfaith families in our synagogues and thank them for being a valued part of our community.

I want to conclude my words this month with a portion of a blessing by my colleague Rabbi Janet Marder. The words and sentiment are deeply held in my heart and here at Temple Sholom!

"Today I want to recognize and publicly acknowledge for the first time some very important people in our congregation. They are part of our congregation because, somewhere along the way, they happened to fall in love with a Jewish man or woman, and that decision changed their life.

I hope that you will not be embarrassed or upset that I am singling you out in this way. The last thing I want is to make you feel uncomfortable. What I do want is to tell you how much you matter to our congregation, and how very grateful we are for what you have done.

You are a very diverse group of people. Some of you are living a Jewish life in virtually all respects. Some of you are devoutly committed to another faith. Some of you do not define yourselves as religious at all. You fall at all points along this spectrum, and we acknowledge and respect your diversity.

What we want to thank you for today is your decision to cast your lot with the Jewish people by becoming part of this congregation, and the love and support you give to your Jewish partner. Most of all, we want to offer our deepest thanks to those of you who are parents, and who are raising your sons and daughters as Jews."

Experiencing the High Holy Day season with you, my new temple family, has been a wonderfully uplifting experience for me. My family and I have been welcomed in so many ways and we feel like a part of the community already. Thank you to all of you who have welcomed us into your

midst! Lisa Pottiger and Melissa Shusterman in particular have been so wonderful as my Transition Committee and I am grateful for their assistance and warmth! Getting to know the Bar and Bat Mitzvah families has been a great joy. Working with the adult choir, Kol Shalom and Shalom Rav has truly been a joyous experience for me and I look forward to continuing to make great music with all of you. I also want to thank Rabbi Rigler and his family and the Temple Sholom staff for doing everything to make my transition run smoothly.

Judaism puts the idea of community at the forefront. We need a *minyan* (a group of ten individuals over the age of 13) to say certain prayers. Even the word synagogue itself is derived from the Greek, meaning assembly. This reflects the Hebrew, *beit Knesset*, which means house of gathering. So it is precisely our gathering together that is at the crux of what we do as Jews and is perhaps even more important than what we do when we come together. A "house of gathering" can be used for prayer,

study, work and play - all things that I hope we engage in together in the year to come.



You chose to become a part of our temple family because of the values that we hold dear. Our congregation is part of a larger Jewish family in the form of the Reform movement itself. Temple Sholom is a congregational member of the Union for Reform Judaism. The URJ will be holding its Biennial gathering this year in Washington, DC from December 12th - 19th. This is the largest gathering of Jews in North America and it's happening so close to home! I hope that you will take this opportunity to join me as a member of our larger Reform community. The Biennial features opportunities to learn, pray, sing, eat, and have fun together. I'll also be participating in a concert featuring cantors of the American Conference of Cantors on Saturday morning and if you attend Biennial, I hope you'll come and give us a listen.

As the winter months approach and more of our gatherings bring us indoors, may we find the doors of our synagogue to be open to us all and may we find strength when we are gathered together as a community.

THE TZEDAKAH FUND NEEDS YOUR SUPPORT!



Here's the situation:

Over US\$2.4 billion is needed to help people affected by the food crisis in the Horn of Africa. Less than half of that has been received so far. UN Secretary-General Ban Ki Moon has made an appeal to all to urgently bridge the gap and reduce the loss of life.

12.4 million people need urgent humanitarian assistance in Djibouti, Kenya, Somalia and Ethiopia.

Refugees from Somalia are fleeing into Kenya and Ethiopia, with about 2,000 people arriving daily.

Famine has been declared in five regions of South Central Somalia and the UN has begun food airlifts into Mogadishu, to try to reach the almost 2.2 million people that have yet to receive aid.

July arrivals in Dadaab camps top 40,400, the highest monthly rate in the camp's 20-year history.

One in three children arriving in Ethiopia is acutely malnourished.

Mortality rates increased in July, with up to 1.8 deaths per 10,000 at Dadaab's Ifo camp.

Malnutrition rates remain a concern among refugee new arrivals in Ethiopia and Kenya.

Your Temple Sholom Tzedakah Fund would like to make a meaningful donation on behalf of our Temple family to the Jewish Coalition for Disaster Relief, an alliance of 49 primarily North American Jewish agencies that provide a unified Jewish response to humanitarian crises. It has formed a special coordinating group in response to the critical situation in East Africa.

RABBI RIGLER ACCEPTED INTO RABBINIC LEADERSHIP PROGRAM!

Rabbi Peter Rigler has been accepted as a participant with the Rabbinic Leadership Program of the Institute for Jewish Spirituality and will begin the course in January.

This 18-month program consists of four five-day retreats, plus weekly study and practice. He joins 37 other rabbis from the Conservative, Reconstructionist and Reform movements who were selected from a large number of applicants.

The Institute for Jewish Spirituality describes itself as, "a cross-denominational, educational organization that strengthens, sustains and inspires mainstream rabbis, cantors, educators and lay leaders. Its work helps to inspire re-dedication to mission and stimulate innovative thinking." The course consists of study, exploration of spiritual practice and worship.

A MESSAGE FROM THE BOARD

That means that over the last few weeks you heard a lot of messages from the Board at services about how great our synagogue really is. But this is the same topic that's usually the subject of these Board messages in the *Tidings*. Not that there's a lack of material on this - we could go on forever about Temple Sholom's greatness - but I feel the need for a new direction here.

The other problem is that Elyse needs my submission NOW. What to do?
