On Friday, May 4<sup>th</sup>, we welcome The Reverend Hentzi Elek from St. Alban's Episcopal Church, in Newtown Square. The Reverend will share with us his Church and teachings he finds meaningful. We will use the evening to begin an ongoing dialogue and relationship with our spiritual neighbor, St. Alban's.

Here is how Hentzi describes himself: I am an Episcopal Priest and the Rector of St. Alban's Episcopal Church, which is in the suburbs of Philadelphia. I've been here for almost 10 years and prior to this parish served two parishes in Northern Virginia. I am married to Sara Barton and we have two children. Lucas and Sophia.

Prior to being ordained I worked for three years overseas: one year doing refugee work in Sudan, one year doing refugee work in Thailand; and one year teaching in Bogotá, Colombia. I also taught high school social studies in New Jersey for two years. I have led groups of teenagers and adults to volunteer in home rebuilding, orphanages, medical clinics, and homeless shelters in: West Virginia, South Carolina, New York City, San Diego, Honduras, Haiti, and India.

Rabbi Rigler will be speaking at St. Albans, 3625 Chapel Road, Newtown Sq., on Sunday morning May 6<sup>th</sup> at 8:00 AM and 10:00 AM and members of the Temple Sholom Community are invited to attend.

# FROM THE DESK OF RABBI RIGLER

Photographs fill our school hallway. Often when I walk by I hear someone say, "Look, that was me." You can see the changes in our students and our building. What is most apparent, though, is the sense of joy you see on all the faces of our Confirmation students. Saturday, May 26<sup>th</sup>, will mark Shavuot and our Confirmation ceremonies at Temple Sholom. The first known Jewish Confirmation took place in Dessau, Germany in 1803, and from there began to spread to other Jewish communities. On Shavuot in 1810,

a service of Confirmation was held at Seesen in Westphalia at the community school, marking the first time the ceremony of Confirmation and the holiday were linked. Several weeks after on July 17, 1810, a grand ceremony with Jewish and Christian leaders participating was held to dedicate the new "Temple" there. The service was led by Israel Jacobsohn. It was an extraordinary event, complete with Torah scrolls being carried seven times around the sanctuary accompanied by choral music.

This year there are 9 Confirmation students in our tenth grade class. They are a wonderful group of talented and committed young people. Many of them have attended Temple Sholom for many years. They are becoming part of a 200-year-old tradition which has distinguished and strengthened our Reform movement.

Teaching and learning with our Confirmation students is one of the highlights of the work I am blessed to do. I come to class prepared with a lesson and rarely, if ever get through it. The students ask probing questions and I can't help but be inspired by their passion for learning. We have explored issues of faith, teen angst, politics and much more.

I hope you will be able to join with our Confirmation Class on Saturday, May 26<sup>th</sup>, as they take their place in a chain of tradition. This will be a ceremony in which this generation of the children of Israel affirms their faith and their ties to our heritage. It is a good moment for all of us and a good sign for the future wellbeing of Judaism here and everywhere!

### **CANTOR SHAPIRO'S NOTES**



#### Passover and Shavuot: from Freedom to Responsibility

This Passover, my family and I did something completely different. We went away on vacation and spent the beginning of the holiday in Key West, Florida. This was a tremendous

change for us! Every year since I was 18 years of age, I've hosted a large seder wherever I've lived. Be it sprawled out on a living room floor with 40 people during college, to an elegant dining room set for 20 (I think that's the smallest we've done until now...) we have always invited family and quests into our home for the holiday.

This year, when my dad and step-mom offered up their Key West condo to us for a week. I didn't hesitate to book our time away during my kids' Spring Break from school. It was only later that I looked at the calendar and realized that it fell over Pesach! I had few moments of fear, thinking, "What have I done? I've always hosted a seder?!?" ... and then I got over myself. Scott, the kids and I had a lovely seder for four on the deck in the warm weather and we all survived. Thanks to Rabbi Rigler's great suggestion, we created our own Hagaddah on-line and brought the laptop with us. We had some great discussions about freedom, discussing the connection between our freedom and our responsibilities as Jews.

According to the Torah (Lev. 23:15), we are obligated to count the days from the second night of Passover to the day before Shavu'ot, seven full weeks. This period is known as the counting of the omer. An omer is a unit of measure. Beginning on the second day of Passover and continuing through Shavuot, in the days of the Temple, an omer of barley was cut down and the entirety was brought to the Temple as an offering.

Today, many Reform Jews haven't even heard of counting the omer. The practice is still observed in the form of a blessing in both Orthodox and Conservative

congregations. Every night, from the second night of Passover to the night before



Shavu'ot, a blessing is recited and the count of the omer is stated in both weeks and days. So on the 16th day, one would say "Blessed are You, Adonai our God, Ruler of the universe, who sanctifies us with mitzvot, and commands us concerning the counting of the omer. Today is sixteen days, which is two weeks and two days of the omer."

Reform Judaism dispensed with the practice of counting the omer. This most probably occurred due to its very tangible connection to sacrifice at the Temple. Reform Judaism does not uphold the belief that the Temple should be restored. Rather, we hope for an age of redemption. However, rituals often couch deeper meanings in their practice. Because we stopped counting the omer, I believe we lost an important message.

The counting itself is intended to remind us of the link between Passover, which commemorates the Exodus, and Shavu'ot, which commemorates the giving of the Torah. It reminds us that our redemption from slavery was not complete until we received the Torah. Thus, along with freedom comes responsibility. For Reform Jews this message has great potential to re-ignite our call to perform acts of social justice. At Passover time we note our freedom from slavery. Connecting our story of redemption to our story of revelation (the giving of Torah) reminds us that we have a responsibility to act upon our convictions. In doing so we may help to create a better world for the generations to follow.

### JLL LECTURES WITH RABBI RIGLER: "GOD" May 9 at 7:30 PM

There is a famous story in which the Kaiser Willhelm asks Otto Van Bismarck, "Can you prove the existence of God?" Bismarck replies, "The Jews, your majesty. The Jews." God is perhaps easier to understand through the lens of our miraculous history than through our everyday view. The concept of God for us as Jews is one of the most difficult topics. I can't tell you how often I am told that a member of our community is an atheist. While Judaism is a religion of deed and not of creed the role of God, theology and spirituality cannot be ignored. I believe that the term God has become so corrupted that of course it is hard to believe in God as we have understood the concept. Join me on May 9<sup>th</sup> at 7:30 PM as we explore the Jewish notion of God. We will study the names, concepts and ideas that we have been struggling with for millennia. We will also have the opportunity to discuss and explore the modern concept of spirituality.

## BOOK REVIEW WITH RABBI RIGLER

#### *"The Life of David," by Robert Pinsky May 2<sup>nd</sup> 11:30 AM in the Library*

From one of our most admired poets, a brilliant retelling of the life of one of the most complex figures in the Bible. Poet, warrior, and king, David has loomed large in myth and legend through the centuries, and he continues to haunt our collective imagination, his flaws and inconsistencies making him the most approachable of biblical heroes. Robert Pinsky, former poet laureate of the United States, plumbs the depths of David's life: his triumphs and his failures, his charm and his cruelty, his divine destiny and his human humiliations. Drawing on the biblical chronicle of David's life as well as on the later commentaries and the Psalms - traditionally considered to be David's own words - Pinsky teases apart the many strands of David's story and reweaves them into a glorious narrative. Under the clarifying and captivating light of Pinsky's erudition and imagination, and his mastery of image and expression, King David - both the man and the idea of the man - is brought brilliantly to life.

### A MESSAGE FROM THE BOARD ....

My family joined Temple Sholom in October 2001. My oldest child was in 6<sup>th</sup> grade at the time. In one month, she will graduate from college. It hardly seems possible. My youngest was not yet three years old and now he is almost six feet tall and in seventh grade. During that time, I went from being a full-time mom to having a full-time job. So many things changed in my life in the last 10-plus years.

During much of that time, six years if I remember correctly, I served on the Board of Trustees. Just as in my own life, many things changed at Temple Sholom during these years. Each of my three children became a Bat or Bar Mitzvah with a different rabbi at the helm and one with a different cantor. We now have new clergy to lead us, and our future couldn't be brighter with the talent and energy Cantor Shapiro and Rabbi Rigler bring to our community. Through all of these changes, some with considerable turmoil and some with great excitement, Temple Sholom has had a significant place in my life and that of my children.

I was not involved – other than as a parent of religious school children – at my previous synagogue. I never felt invited or figured out how to connect to the lay leadership. We joined Temple Sholom very shortly after 9/11 for a variety of reasons, but mainly to find a place where we were comfortable and felt welcome. I certainly found that at Temple Sholom. The very day I met with the director to discuss membership, a congregant asked me to become involved. Of course, I didn't commit then, but it was nice to be asked.

We were welcomed with open arms and I felt at home as I never had before in a religious institution. I took that congregant, now one of my dearest friends, up on her offer to join a committee. I worked on the Capital Campaign and the Renovation Committee before I decided to join the Board.

The Board at Temple Sholom is a working board – a collection of doers. Members of the Board are expected to participate in the way that is most comfortable for that individual. We run on the contributions of effort and talent that we have within our membership. Everyone has something to contribute - energy, effort, creativity, hard work, inspiration, dedication and, yes, if possible, cold hard cash. Every year, the Board Nomination Committee looks to the congregation to seek new members for the Board. New Board members are voted into office at the Congregational meeting in June. (*Editor's note: This year on June 10<sup>th</sup> at 5 PM.*) The Board has made decisions to open the Preschool, decisions regarding clergy and staff, decisions about building maintenance, budget decisions, decisions about how Temple Sholom operates and about priorities for the future, just to name a few. Contributions made by each person on the Board keep Temple Sholom moving forward.

Board membership at Temple Sholom is not mysterious or only for big donors. Temple Sholom belongs to all of us. We all have the opportunity to contribute and have a say in the direction we choose for our future. It is a wonderful way to show our children what community service looks like and a way to forge a strong connection with our community. We have much in common simply by virtue of having chosen Temple Sholom.

I highly recommend becoming involved. Over the next year join a committee. There are twenty-five different committees, everything from budget, to hospice and healing, membership, religious school and Preschool, Temple Beautiful, technology, and long range planning. Consider serving on a committee. Consider serving on the Board. I'm not sure I would have become involved if I had not been asked.

We all have talents that can be used to benefit the community. You will see how rewarding it is and how much more you get back than you could ever give. To be a member of the Board or to serve on a committee, you simply need a little bit of time and a willingness to participate.

If you have questions, find a Board member. We usher at Shabbat services and High Holy Days. We are around. The office can put you in touch with one of us. Come to the Congregational meeting in June. Come to a Board meeting to see what goes on. Meetings are once a month and open to the congregation. Keep us posted on how you feel about Temple Sholom; it is important for us to know if you have questions or concerns or just want to tell us how wonderful it is to belong to this Temple family.

#### Regular Monthly Meeting:

At our regular monthly meeting on May 17<sup>th</sup> at 7:30 PM, Dr. Henriette Dahan Kalev, Ph.D, Founder and First Chair of the Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences at Israel's Ben Gurion University, will discuss "Israel Between the Arab Spring and the Iranian Threat." Dr. Dahan Kalev has written articles and edited books on: Critical Politics and Democracy; Human Rights; Race, Class and Gender in Israel; Zionism and its Critics; and Transcending the Arab-Israeli Conflict. Her latest book, entitled, Palestinian Activism in Israel: Bedouin Women Leaders in a Changing Middle East, is scheduled for publication. 
