#### From the Desk of Rabbi Rigler



I vividly recall my own Confirmation: The writing I crafted with a Camp and home friend, rehearsals, the offering of flowers, the white robes, the presentations and speeches, the reading of the

the priestly blessing bestowed upon me by my Rabbi Eric Wisnia. At that moment I knew much more about Jewish life and tradition than I had three years earlier at my Bar Mitzvah. Today, I am always excited at Shavuot to see empowered teens take their seats on the bimah at this special milestone. Like Ruth. their first commitment to Judaism at 13 has developed fully into a deliberate and meaningful life of Jewish fulfillment. We try to make the tenth grade year one that is engaging, challenging and exciting. I hope to connect with the teens so they know they always have a safe home at Temple Sholom. We also try to connect them to one another ... this year students had the chance to explore the holy land of Israel, attend an incredible seminar on social justice and lobbying at the Religious Action Center in Washington, DC, and bond each week of class.

Where did this ritual of Confirmation start? In 1801, in Seesen Germany, Israel Jacobson, a founder of Reform Judaism, started a radical new school. This school would teach Jewish subjects as well as arithmetic and science all in the German language (as opposed to Yiddish). But the most radical idea of all was that both boys and girls would be taught there together in the same classes. The natural outgrowth of a commitment to an educational equality of the sexes was an equality of ceremony as well. Only a few years later, Jewish reformers in Berlin argued, that "since young women were being educated with the young men, they should be confirmed with them as well. They should formally be welcomed as worshipers and leaders in the synagogue ritual. A class composed of girls and boys was confirmed in Berlin in 1817. This innovation made such sense that in the following year, girls were confirmed with boys in the Hamburg congregation too." (Eugene Borowitz, "Explaining Reform Judaism" p.9)

Since that time, Confirmation of a community's 10<sup>th</sup> graders has been the norm in Reform congregations. For many decades it replaced Bar Mitzvah completely, and only in the last 50 years or so has Bar Mitzvah returned of course with an equal celebration of Bat Mitzvah in Reform congregations.

At Temple Sholom and usually in other congregations as well, Confirmation takes place during Shavuot. This holiday celebrates the moment the Israelites received the Torah. It was the moment of commitment from God to the Jewish people and the Jewish people to God, and confirmation is the Ten Commandments and Ruth and commitment from our students of their intention to live their lives as Jews and as a part of the Jewish community as well as the community's commitment to our students, to always be there to support their Jewish lives.

> This year's group is incredible! They are deeply committed to Judaism, each other, our congregation and, I must also say, talking and laughing. I have watched them as teachers' aides in the Religious School, leading services for our students, in our teen and child choirs, reading Torah, in our Rosh Hodesh girls group and everywhere in between. They are kind, fun and passionate about Judaism. At times debates seemed to erupt over important issues. This year we studied, explored prayer, created, shared and enjoyed our time together. The service the students are creating this year is unique! They are incorporating our technology in new ways and taking some great risks! I hope that you will come support this group of students and share their confirmation service and our holiday of Shavuot!

#### CANTOR SHAPIRO'S MESSAGE



Since I have become a mom, I have always spent my Sunday mornings working in a Religious School setting. One of these days, I swear I'm going to get that breakfast in bed! First, I have to teach my kids how to make a good omelet.

Mother's Day is a uniquely American invention and was first celebrated in the early 1900s with a Memorial Service by one Anna Jarvis, for her deceased mother. By 1912, the holiday had become very popular, but Anna was already jaded by its swift move from a holiday with the intent of honoring mothers toward becoming a commercial holiday.

In Judaism we celebrate mothers every day, but May is a great month to remember the ways in which we do. There is actually a Jewish mother's day recognized within the Orthodox world upon which we commemorate the supposed day of death of Rachel on the 11<sup>th</sup> of *Heshvan*. While not an official holiday, in Israel, Henrietta Szold's *yahrzeit* is commemorated as *Yom Ha'em* (Mother's day) or *Yom Hamishpacha* (Family day) in many kindergarten classrooms. It's really interesting that Henrietta Szold herself had no biological children of her own. She was, however, responsible for saving many children from the hands of the Nazi regime and so she is remembered as a mother to many.

In many traditional homes, after the family returns home from synagogue on a Friday evening, the song *Eshet Chayil* (A Woman of Valor) is chanted by husband to wife after the family sings *Shalom Aleichem* and before the meal is served. The Midrash teaches that the words were written by Abraham as a eulogy for his wife Sarah:

A Woman of Valor, who can find? She is more precious than corals.

Her husband places his trust in her and profits only thereby.

She brings him good, not harm, all the days of her life.

She seeks out wool and flax and cheerfully does the work of her hands.

She is like the trading ships, bringing food from afar. She gets up while it is still night to provide food for her household, and a fair share for her staff. She considers a field and purchases it, and plants a vineyard with the fruit of her labors. She invests herself with strength and makes her arms powerful.

She senses that her trade is profitable; her light does not go out at night.

She stretches out her hands to the distaff and her palms hold the spindle.

She opens her hands to the poor and reaches out her hands to the needy.

She has no fear of the snow for her household, for all her household is dressed in fine clothing.

She makes her own bedspreads; her clothing is of fine linen and luxurious cloth.

Her husband is known at the gates, where he sits with the elders of the land.

She makes and sells linens; she supplies the merchants with sashes.

She is robed in strength and dignity, and she smiles at the future.

She opens her mouth with wisdom and a lesson of kindness is on her tongue.

She looks after the conduct of her household and never tastes the bread of laziness.

Her children rise up and make her happy; her husband praises her:

"Many women have excelled, but you excel them all!" Grace is elusive and beauty is vain, but a woman who fears God -- she shall be praised. Give her credit for the fruit of her labors, and let her achievements praise her at the gates.

While some of the language and ideas may seem outdated (for instance the model calls for the traditional marriage of husband and wife and there is, as far as I know, no new *eshet chayil* to be chanted from wife to wife) the idea is beautiful. Taking a moment to pause at the end of the week and chant praise for a loved one is something that serves as a symbolic act. The act of chanting serves to remind one of all that is precious within the beloved. This mother's day, let's think about this model. I think it's better than a card! But I'm sure that breakfast in bed would still be appreciated.

Hassidim see it as a moment of great holiness on Shabbat afternoon. We see it as a time to study, share music and enjoy each others company with drinks and light hors d'oeuvres. #### A WORD FROM THE BOARD

It began in March as I stood along the sideline enduring thirty degree temperatures as my youngest son began lacrosse practice. It was that familiar feeling that I experience every year toward the end of winter. It starts as a mild irritation at how cold it constantly is, at how I have to wear a heavy coat whenever I go out, at how lifeless the trees look as they stand devoid of leaves against the grey sky. Where are all of the colors? "Lacrosse is a spring sport, it's played in shorts. Spring must be coming soon, the calendar and that blasted groundhog say so," I told myself as I went back to my car to find my winter hat and gloves in an attempt to stop the shivering. "I'm eating matzah, it should certainly be warmer than this," I told myself later that month. Any charms that winter held had long since vanished. I had reached that point that I reach every year, I had become completely sick of winter and could not wait for it to end.

I am happy to report that my bout with cabin fever has now ended. Flowers are blooming, birds are chirping, and the world is awash in colors. Neighbors who have not been seen in months can again be spotted outside peering cautiously at the unfamiliar warming orb in the sky as they reacclimate themselves with the outdoor world. All those chores I have been putting off can now be completed. Even do-it-yourself projects that always seem to take at least four times as long as planned and entail at least two extra trips to the hardware store are welcome. Toys that have been stored in the garage with only slight and chilled use in the winter have been dusted off. lubed and are once again purring down the road. Graduations and proms are right around the corner. Spring is here!

Spring is of course the season of renewal. Two events this springtime helped to renew the positive feelings I get by serving on the Board. The first came from my calls as a member of the Board of Trustees to Temple Sholom members to wish them a Happy Passover. I really was not enamored with the idea of making these calls when I first became a member of the Board. What I subsequently discovered is that people really do like the fact that the Temple reaches out to provide holiday wishes and to ask the members how they like the Temple. Not only do the calls help foster a spirit of community, but they serve as a great way for the Board to get feedback from the members. We really do listen and take to heart the comments that we

receive from the calls. I strongly encourage members to provide your thoughts on the Temple to the Board member who calls you for the High Holy Days and for Passover.

The Holocaust Memorial Names Project was the other renewing event this spring. For those of you that don't know, the Temple hosted the reading of the names of Holocaust victims for twenty-four straight hours during Yom HaShoah (Holocaust Remembrance Day). I arrived at the Temple at 2:20 a.m., a few minutes before my allotted reading time. There at the bimah was a girl from the Bryn Mawr College Hillel, with two of her friends, reading the names of those whose chance to see the wonders of spring were tragically cut short. As I waited my turn, my sleep deprived brain actually pondered whether we would run out of names given that the readings were going on for one whole day. Then it hit me, what a ridiculous thought; there were so many, six million. The question was not whether we would run out of names, but whether we could read enough.

When it was my turn, I went up to the bimah and saw page after page of names. I knew the pages represented only a small fraction of all the names. The age of each victim was listed next to their name. So many children, so young. I tried so hard to get each name right, for these names had not been uttered for so long and their owners were not there to correct me. The reading of those names was truly awe inspiring. A wonderful but somber thought went through my mind as I read, lives that had been lost in the winter of the Holocaust, were in some small way, renewed this Spring.



#### Our Remarkable Teens: Samantha Prager and Noah Mendell

#### **NFTY Convention A Wonderful Experience for Samantha Prager**

My name is Samantha Prager and I am currently a member of ToaSTY (Temple Sholom's Youth Group) as well as serving me second term of Social Action Vice President of NFTY-PAR. Youth group has always been a vital part of my life. Ever Samantha (bottom row) and PAR since I was a freshmen in high school I Board during Asef fah. have been involved in both NFTY and

ToaSTY. ToaSTY is a part of NFTY-PAR, but NFTY-PAR is a part of an even bigger organization known as NFTY. NFTY stands for the North American Federation of Temple Youth. ToaSTY one of the youth groups that makes up NFTY-PAR, and NFTY-PAR is one of 19 regions that make up NFTY. By attending both Youth Group, and Regional events I was able to meet friends all over the Tri-State area and even the entire country. NFTY -PAR is a regional youth group for reform Jewish teens. We meet roughly six times a year for weekend long events. Myself, along with six other teens and our advisor, Amanda Wachstein, we plan and execute these events at Camp Harlam in the Poconos.

It was held in Los Angeles, California and all 19 NFTY regions came together for one huge, reform Jewish, teen event, NFTY is so great, because it is made for the youth and is also led by the youth. It was so empowering to see just how committed and driven all



1000 of us (NFTYites we call ourselves). We were all there in support of the URJ as well as recognizing that we are the future of the URJ. Throughout the weekend, we discussed the Campaign for Engagement, which is an initiative by the URJ to get young adults involved in their Judaism because there is an age where young Jewish adults simply are not involved. Most young Jewish adults between the ages of 18 and 25 do not

belong to a synagogue. The Campaign for Youth Engagement asks the question ... why? Well who better to ask than young adults themselves. Throughout the week I participated in workshops on leadership and advocacy. As well as volunteered at a local animal shelter and learned about the organization Operation Blankets of Love. Seeing all of NFTY together in one place was empowering. It was great to see so many other reform Jewish teens who had the same interests as me, as well as the ones whose thoughts differed.

NFTY-PAR is such an amazing organization. It is a place where anyone can fit in, and everyone has his or her niche. The best part about NFTY is that it made me want to be Jewish. Learning about what it means to be a reform. Jewish teen has made me not only want to be Jewish, but to be proud of my Judaism. Because of NFTY I will be involved in Hillel at college, and I will take the leadership skills I have learned with me forever.

Cedar Lake's motto is, "Your home away from home." This is really true. Where I live, in my community and in my school, Jews are a minority. Even though I really enjoy coming to Academy on Monday nights, an hour and a half per week of Jewish education isn't nearly enough time to learn about and really embrace my Jewish culture. For four weeks a year, I can fully surround myself with other people who share my beliefs and my heritage.

Camp is an amazing way to take a step back and really see the big picture. For most of the year, I learn about one part of the world of Judaism. At camp, I can immerse myself in a sea of Jews from places such as California, Puerto Rico, Australia, England, Israel and many other places, too. At Cedar Lake, people from all over the world each share part of their Jewish culture. It's like we're making a quilt where everyone contributes a unique patch. After camp is over, I carry home this quilt and share with my family and Temple Sholom friends what I've learned about Jewish traditions that happen beyond the doors of our synagogue. Since I will have added patches to other people's quilts, they will take a piece of our synagogue and our traditions home with them, too. Camp lets Jewish kids and teens extend their experience of our religion from just seeing one small piece, to seeing the entire puzzle.

How will going to a Jewish camp affect me in the long run? I think I'll have a better understanding of Judaism, and a closer connection with people - kids and adults - who understand and appreciate our shared heritage. At home, I have only a few Jewish friends who I interact with outside of Hebrew School. Camp gives me an opportunity to meet and really bond with people who understand my religion. Because of camp, I have Jewish friends all over the world who broaden my horizons about what it means to be a Jew. I hope that this summer will widen my understanding of Judaism even more, because the more of the big picture I can see, the better Jew I can be.

Camp is an incredible experience. You create a lifetime of friends and memories in just one summer. Each time you go, you build on these memories and experiences. I'm hoping that one day, I'll have amazing opportunities to see my friends from camp on their home turfs, in their synagogues and their cities. Someday, I hope this will lead me to Israel, the center of Judaism. I know that will be something that will be a part of me forever. Camp is one very important step in my journey as a Jewish person. I know it will create a lasting effect on me that will stick with me for the rest of my life. I won't waste this opportunity to become closer to my religion.

I gave it to the Holocaust Awareness Museum. because they collect stories of survivors, so that their stories are never forgotten. If the Holocaust is forgotten, then it will probably be repeated, which is a terrible thing to happen. Throughout all this, it has made me appreciate having my family with me, and appreciate everything I have.

# THEY WERE MORE THAN JUST NAMES

#### **A Yom HaShoah Recollection**

I saw the invite to read names on Yom HaShoah and I knew I wanted to do it. When I finally got a chance to sign up I expected to be part of the late night crew. I was surprised to see that despite many signups, the first time slot was still available. So I put my name down and put it on my calendar.

The service preceding the readings was normal. The comments from several rabbis was normal. The reading was anything but. They were just names. I didn't expect anything special.

In my mind this was like attending a memorial service. It was a service for some folks I didn't know but who I wanted to honor.

It was an event of great magnitude, but it was also over 70 years ago. I didn't have to write a speech or read anything special. Just read a list of names. Easy, right?

Those who know me well know I'm an emotional guy. I don't mind it. I like being emotionally available, as they say. When something moves me I go with it. The only downside to this is it makes things like doing the speech at both of our sons' Bar Mitzvahs a bit challenging.

Well, I found simply reading these names was not as easy as I expected. As I focused on pronouncing their names as authentically as possible, the other part of my mind started thinking. They weren't just names. These were people. These were lives - lives that were snuffed out unceremoniously, callously, thoughtlessly.

Along with their names I read their countries of origin: Poland, Hungary, USSR, and Germany among them. Unread, but also listed were their ages. All ages were there, young and old, male and female. Each wasn't simply an individual, each was a potential

parent, each represented generations never to be born. Art yet to be created. Scientific discoveries yet to be made. Bar and Bat Mitzvahs never to be realized.

This wasn't just a memorial service. These weren't just names. It was all much, much more.

May their memories be a blessing.



#### WHY JEWISH GENEALOGY, AND WHY NOW?

Hilltoppers members were treated to a fascinating presentation recently by Dr. Stephen Schecter, an expert in Jewish genealogy.

The audience listened in rapt attention while Steve (as he prefers being called) explained that Jewish genealogy is a way to personally connect with history. We must become involved now, he noted because of the advanced age of Holocaust survivors and because we are experiencing the final generation of native Yiddish speakers. Whereas Yiddish had formerly been a defining language, it is now almost totally forgotten, other than rare Yiddish Culture Clubs found in certain urban areas.

Participants learned that we Americans are rapidly losing the stories of the waves of Jewish immigrants – the Germans from around 1860 and the Eastern Europeans from approximately 1880 to 1915. Steve pointedly referenced Hilltoppers members who now have the responsibility to remember the stories they have learned and to pass them on.

One of the reasons that Yiddish and its stories are disappearing is because when Israel attained statehood, the citizens decided to make Hebrew the official, modern language, thereby pushing Yiddish to the side. Therefore, only Chassidic Jews still maintain Yiddish as a vibrant language.

From Steve's PowerPoint presentation, we learned that modern-day Jews have captured the history of the Jewish people fairly well from the Holocaust and onward, but we're beginning to forget the Jewish culture that preceded the Holocaust. According to Steve, the best way to fill our gaps in history is with the stories of our ancestors.


As an aside, Steve explained that Ashkenazic Jews were the most insular people in the world. That explains why we have the highest incidence of genetic disease. If we can learn more about our Jewish histories, we will learn more about our high rates of birth defects, Crohn's Disease, Bracha 1 markers, and more.

Furthermore, Steve noted, we need to keep up to date with the richness and depth of our Jewish history. By understanding that, we will take to heart that family history is perishable. Through modern techniques, we can discover the names of our ancestors – that's durable. What's not durable is discovering the stories from our ancestors.

The question is: "Why is it our responsibility to uncover our ancestors' stories?" Because we have the ability to leave a legacy and we will also be able to feel the joy of the search. Steve admits that the search can often include much boredom but it's nearly always followed up by the euphoria of the discovery.

The recommendation is to not procrastinate. There are lessons to be learned from the Jewish Genealogical Society. You can purchase software to help you in your search. There are ways to organize your papers, websites to access, and movies and other media to aid you. Also, Dr. Stephen Schecter teaches a class to help get you started.


