students that will soon after be hung in our school hallway. I feel very blessed to share our Confirmation with our students. These students are

dedicated, kind and love being here at Temple Sholom! I am also honored to share the words of the Priestly blessing (Birkat Kohanim) with them. These blessings recited in Jerusalem thousands of years ago by the priests - Kohanim - were delivered on behalf of the people of Israel at the conclusion of the daily Temple service:

May God bless you and keep you! May God deal kindly and graciously with you! May God bestow favor upon you and grant you peace!

These fifteen carefully crafted words have been intoned for centuries in exactly the same way that God instructs Moses to teach them to Aaron. Think how many times these words have been recited to bless another person! At Shabbat tables, weddings, consecrations, birthdays and so much more.

In just a few days we will take a very Perhaps we take for granted the intrinsic meaning of important picture of our Confirmation these words of blessing, for they are used quite often in our modern practice. The blessing was originally intoned by Aaron the High Priest and later by Aaron's descendants. In a traditional service, only the Kohanim (those descended from Aaron) recite this blessing, after preparing themselves in a special way. The rabbis taught that it was the priests who were commanded to utter the blessing in order to help establish the authority of the priesthood and the centrality of the Temple.

The *Kohanim* were not the source of the blessing but rather the conduit for the blessing. The rabbis say that only God can bless the people. Is one person holier than another? Our teachers say that everyone is holy, and no one is holier than the next person. In addition, our holiness does not replace or approximate God but rather allows us to let God into our lives so that we become a sacred vessel of God's holy gifts. Thus we are all the holy instruments of God's blessing.

When I stand on our *Bimah* I am not giving a blessing, rather I am sharing a moment of blessing on behalf of you, our Temple Sholom family. I am honored to share this blessing as we honor our students and their connection!

Soup Challenge

THE 10,000 CAN MOTHER'S DAY The 10,000 Can Mother's Day Soup Challenge was created to raise awareness about hunger in our community by the Marple-Newtown Clergy Association and organized by Reverend Hentzi Elek and our own Rabbi Peter Rigler. In the immediate Delaware County area, 100,000 people representing 20% of our total County population suffer from food insecurity and seek food assistance. The Delaware County food pantries that serve them cannot do it alone and our faith communities want to bring together our neighbors, friends and family members to help our own.

> On Wednesday, April 30, members of the Marple Newtown Clergy Association and congregants met at MOM's Organic Market, in Bryn Mawr, Pennsylvania to raise awareness about hunger in our communities. The hope was to remind people about the need in our own community and to increase the general excitement level about donating food to our neighbors who struggle so very, very hard.

While the drive is over, the need continues and Temple Sholom will continue to collect food for the St. Marks Food Center in Broomall and the Delco Interfaith Food Assistance Network throughout the year. Donations are always welcome and appreciated.

CANTOR SHAPIRO'S MESSAGE

When taking one's leave in Israel, it's much more common to say "l'hit'ra'ot" than it is to say "shalom". "L'hit'ra'ot" means "I'll see you again."

In the time I've spent here at Temple Sholom, I've learned new music, been able to grow and learn with the congregation, and have been blessed to work with a great team.

As I prepare to embark on a new journey, I realize that while I'd like to say, "l'hit'ra'ot" to all of you, that this may actually be a "shalom" moment.

We teach the kids in religious school that "shalom" means "hello, goodbye, and peace." In fact, it means peace, but is used as a greeting and a goodbye as well. Inherent in this

word, that is a part of our own Temple's name, is the root (*shin, lamed, mem*) that means wholeness, or completeness. Whenever I do a teaching on the meaning of Shalom, it makes me think of Shel Silverstein's "*The Missing Piece*," in which he describes a circle missing a pie shaped piece, searching for peace and wholeness.

At this time of goodbye, I'd like to say "l'hit'ra'ot" and hope my path and yours will cross in the future. I also wish all of you "Shalom." May your path be filled with wholeness and peace.

Time flies when you're having fun and 20 years seems like a moment to Becky Krangel. Temple Sholom will mark Becky's 20 years of service at a special Shabbat Service honoring Becky on Friday, June 6, 2014. We sat down with Becky to talk with her about her history and her time working at Temple Sholom.

Please tell us about your early Jewish Journey.

I grew up in Overbrook Park and lived there until I was 19 years old. Growing up, I did not belong to a synagogue, but I did attend the local Folkshul (Hebrew Day School). I moved to Delaware County after I got married. We joined Temple Sholom in 1982 and enjoyed the community very much.

I remember the day I talked with the then Administrator, Missy Lowdermilk about an opening. She said "yes", to my delight and I started the next day. I was hired for all around office work including working on the new computer. I had some experience on computers, but I had to learn all new programs. I was nervous about it, but soon learned how to use it. Back then, we had to apply stamps the "old fashioned way". It took hours to just prepare the envelopes for **all** congregational information. We didn't even have an intercom system on the phone.

Tell us how Temple Sholom and your job have changed.

In addition to using the computer for most of our communication, we now have a postage machine. I have reported to Rabbi Mayer Selekman, Rabbi Peter Hyman, Rabbi Rena Spicehandler, Rabbi Peter Rigler, Cantor Patrice Kaplan, Cantor Kerith Spencer-Shapiro, Norman Sassler, Missy Lowdermilk, Ned Kripke and Abbey Krain. They all

have been a delight. Congregants have come and gone and come back. As the longest employee, I carry the Temple Sholom memory. I know the congregants through time. I enjoy the members and multiple friends were members. I have been blessed with wonderful volunteers over the years: Evie Elias, Norma Munin, Hilda Arnold, Cindy & Jim Meyer, Cindy Verbofsky, Fran Epstein, Norman and Elissa Chansky, Deb Kirsch and Sandy Dell. We really could not do what we do without the volunteers.

Tell us what you do at Temple Sholom.

Every day is an adventure. I answer phones, send out notices, mail out thousands of letters, assign B'nai Mitzvah dates, order all office supplies, track all RSVPs to programs, events and activities, let people in and out and produce all service programs.

My busiest time starts in June when the Welcome Back Packets are prepared and sent out. High Holidays begins at the same time. It is very stressful, but we get through it. Abbey Krain, Sandy Cohen, Nertila Kocibelli, Betsy Blackburn-Goslin, Lori Green, Liz Sussman and Bob White are so helpful and make me feel part of the team.

Is there anything else you would like to share?

I am grateful that I work in such a wonderful place. I've had the time of my life working here and every day is an adventure.

Becky has two children. Her son Josh is married to Alison. They live in Lafayette Hill, PA with their two children, Ryan and Jordan. Her daughter, Terri is married to Dan. They live in MA with their three children, Ross, Emily and Holly. Temple Sholom is grateful for Becky.

WORD FROM THE TEMPLE BOARD

House of Worship

We are fortunate to have our services conducted by Rabbi Rigler and Cantor Shapiro, who lead our worship providing comfort and reinvigorating our Jewish heritage. In addition to our wonderful clergy, the Religious School provides the formal schooling for Judaism's future. Some of the many additional activities at the Temple include Hilltopper's, Sisterhood, Brotherhood, Scholar In Residence, school activities, classes, and holiday events. These are some of the most important reasons to belong to our community.

Along with the spiritual side of our House of Worship, we also have to be thankful for our physical building. We should remember to be appreciative of the walls that house the families of our community.

Just as our cars and personal homes need constant maintenance and updates for the continued uninterrupted use, pleasing presentation, and reliable operation, so do our Temple's facilities. The result of this harsh winter can be seen on segments of the exterior of the main building, the grounds area, including the paved areas. The House Beautiful Committee, chaired by Vera Neumann-Sachs, has undertaken a major project to develop an overall plan for the entire facility, including the outside grounds, including a planned playground area for the Preschool. The successful update of the two bathrooms close to the gift shop was a single project that made us realize, once again, that we need an overall plan and schedule that considers

budgetary constraints to keep our "house" in good working order. Just as the bathrooms provided a significant improvement, the committee is looking forward to providing for the update and maintenance of the overall facility.

Some of the areas that are being reviewed are: 1) a maintenance and replacement schedule of major equipment (e.g., our main heating boiler and air conditioning units), 2) assessment and repair of the leaky sanctuary roof along with building gutters and downspouts, 3) driveway stabilization and ground drainage issues, 4) evaluation/repair/replacement of outside siding, 5) electrical and lighting issues, 6) facility inclusivity changes/additions, and 7) security enhancements to the school area including the annex and the main building, to name a few.

My participation on the annual Budget Committee and heading up this past year's Annual Giving Fund Drive help to keep our "house" in financial order. Now it is time to work on the physical "house". If you have an area of expertise and would like to be included in the committee's work, have a suggestion to be considered, or ideas to help with fund raising to implement the Committee's plans, please call me or Abbey Krain.

We want you to know that your membership dues payments make a difference to all of our Temple community. The graphs below provide you with a snapshot of our overall





Conversations with Men (a.k.a. Men's Spirituality)



For those of you who are wondering about the title, this group was formed partly in response to the Women's Spirituality group. The women wanted a group where they could feel free to speak their minds. Well, it

took a while, but the guys formed their own group a few years ago. ;-) This year our little group really hit its stride.

Our open and growing collection of 12 semi-regulars resulted in great discussions around some extremely interesting topics.

We started with a discussion of how God has been portrayed at the movies. Oh God! We then explored how some folks feel that science and spirituality are mutually exclusive while other folks feel they must be compatible.

We went on to examine the history and wisdom of the *Pirkei Avot*. We shared our understandings of the *Torah* in the light of revelations of modern science, and we delved into the history of Jewish Mysticism. We discussed the rise of militant atheism and its similarities to fundamentalist religions. We considered the differences between being

merely religious and being spiritual. And finally, we explored the history of God, how our concepts of God have grown as man has grown, and what the future of the God concept is likely to evolve into.

We meet one Sunday each month from September through April from 9:30 to 11:00 am at the Temple - usually in the Rabbi's Study.

News from the Inclusion and Special Needs Committee

As chair of the Inclusion & Special Needs Committee, I represented Temple Sholom at the Special Needs Consortium of Greater Philadelphia where I met with representatives from religious schools, special needs organizations, and local temples. I learned that the temples that do have an Inclusion committee such as ours generally have had these committees for a short time, just like us. While the committee is still young, when someone asked me what we had "accomplished" so far I found the list was amazing.

Your committee has been incredibly ambitious and productive in just one year. I bragged like a proud Jewish mama about how:

- ➤ Shirley Birenbaum arranged a program about seeing-eye dogs for the Religious School in honor of Jewish Disabilities Awareness Month
- Cindy Fastman purchased a Braille prayer book for our Sanctuary
- Cindy Meyer assured that the large print prayer books are labeled and available for services

- Ruth Conboy worked with the Rabbi to present a meaningful Shabbat Service in honor of Jewish Disabilities Awareness Month in February
- ➤ Kim Segal worked with Lori Green to learn more about how our Religious School meets the needs of students with special needs and how we can help them do even more
- Barbara Clarke has done outreach with the Preschool to address accommodations for children with special needs
- Ellie Segal is preparing information and recommendations regarding the need for better access and parking spaces for people with mobility challenges
- And I (Gina Levin) have worked with the administration and clergy to assure that people with hearing and visual impairments have accommodations such as a sign language interpreter and reserved seating.

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The Inclusion & Special Needs Committee is continuing with the goal of Temple Sholom becoming a fully inclusive synagogue and community within the next few years. We have studied the *Torah* which teaches us to welcome and include people of all abilities, and that the need for spiritual connection and participation in the Jewish community is within all of us. Moses was chosen by God for a very important task and to be a leader, despite his disability, or because of it. We are in the process of educating all auxiliary groups and committees who plan events and programs at Temple Sholom so that they can incorporate and implement the strategies that will help members, guests, and future members have full access so that they can fully participate in our spiritual and social life.

What's next on the agenda? We are working with the Rabbi to plan some Family Shabbat Services that will accommodate children with special needs such as sensory challenges, especially children who are considered autistic or "on the spectrum." We hope to integrate a real-time closed captioning software program to assist hearing impaired people during services.

If you would like to support the work of the Inclusion and Special Needs Committee, and are not available to join the committee, consider making a donation to the newly created Inclusion Fund which will enable us to purchase necessary adaptive equipment or engage the professional services of specialists. We thank the Board of Trustees, especially Temple President, Michael Danowitz, our wonderful clergy, and incredible Administration for its support of the work of the Inclusion Committee. As everyone becomes more sensitized to the needs of adults and children with special needs, this committee hopes to be out of a job because inclusion and accommodations will be part of the fabric of the community here at Temple Sholom.

Dr. Bruce Bogdanoff Wows Hilltoppers With 'The Story Behind The Song'

Imagine an entertainer and musical scholar who promises an evening of "The Story Behind the Song," and whatever expectations you might have had would be blown away by the fun and knowledge imparted recently by Dr. Bruce Bogdanoff during an April Hilltoppers event.

More than 50 attendees, both Hilltoppers and community members, packed the front of the Sanctuary to sing along and listen to this unique oneman show. No wonder Bogdanoff has so many fans: he performs in musical theatre, many senior centers



and was formerly a featured musician with the Philadelphia Orchestra.

The program opened with the song "Young at Heart," formerly known as "Moonglow." The audience sang along, and most knew the lyrics. The next selection was "Moon River." Bogdanoff noted that the song became

famous by Andy Williams for the movie "Breakfast at Tiffany's," featuring Audrey Hepburn. Did you ever wonder what "my Huckleberry friend" means in the lyrics? According to the lyricist Johnny Mercer, they meant absolutely nothing! He made them up to fit in with the music.

Bogdanoff was filled with musical anecdotes. Because 2014 is the 50th anniversary of "Fiddler on the Roof," audience members learned that lyricists and composers Sheldon Harnick and Jerry Bok originally wrote "Sunrise, Sunset" without the stanza of "What words of wisdom …" That part was added later.

And who knew that the music to "Exodus," which won a 1961 Academy Award, was originally composed by Ernest Gold ... with no words! Gold asked for submissions of lyrics but disliked all of them until Pat Boone wrote the lyrics to Exodus on the back of a Christmas card and then sent it to Gold. That card is now on display in Yad Vashem in Israel.



About the book: But for its lyrical, evocative scenes of life in the Calcutta neighborhood in which her heroes grow up, Jhumpa Lahiri's "The Lowland" could be set anywhere, in almost any time. At the center of this heartbreaking story are two very different brothers. Udayan, the younger by 15 months, is passionate, idealistic and ripe for involvement in the political rebellion in 1960s India (not all that different from his American counterparts of the same era.) Subhash is the "good brother," the parent-pleaser, who goes off to study and teach in America. But when Udavan, inevitably, ends up a victim of his self-made political violence, Subhash steps in and marries his dead brother's pregnant wife. His is the proverbial good deed that will never go unpunished; Subhash soon becomes a victim of his own goodness. As always, Lahiri's prose is lyrical and rich and her story is steeped in history, but in this book (more perhaps than "The *Namesake*", her other novel) the issues raised are more universal and the plot more linear.

Competitive siblings, parental love, commitment to belief and family, these are the topics one of our most brilliant writers addresses in what is at once her most accessible, and most profound, book yet.

MEMORY MAKERS: STEVE AND ILENE BERGER

Temple Sholom: A Family Affair

Sometimes it's difficult to determine who belongs in the Memory Makers column but it's easy to understand why Ilene and Steve Berger belong here. They have been with Temple Sholom in Broomall for 36 years and definitely plan to stay.

The Berger's connection to Temple Sholom is a family affair. They wanted their son Jeff, age 2, to be a member. Today, Jeff and his wife Elizabeth and their children Stella, Caleb and Jacob are all members. Their son Dan, who is married to Ashly and their children Isabella and Hudson, are also members. In addition, their daughter Cindy, married to Kevin, and their son Micah are members, too. Two years ago, Steve and Ilene brought in Steve's parents who had been living in Florida, Betty and Irv Berger, bringing the Berger connection to Temple Sholom up to four generations.

Ilene notes, "We are very grateful to the Temple. We have two children who have married out of the faith and are very welcome here at Temple Sholom. Our daughter-in-law Elizabeth has often told me that Temple Sholom is very comfortable and welcoming. I believe there is nowhere else that opens its arms like Temple Sholom does."

Both Ilene and Steve agree that Temple Sholom was their first religious affiliation after their marriage ... and will probably be their last! "We made sure our children went through religious school and became Bar and Bat Mitzvah here," relates Steve.

Their Jewish upbringings were dissimilar but their joining together at Temple Sholom was a harmonious meeting place. Ilene was born in The Bronx "and we lived in a Jewish ghetto," explains Ilene. Growing up, her family moved to Teaneck, NJ, where they were active in the JCC. "Both my parents were Jewish and we were traditionally Jewish, but not formally observant," notes Ilene. Neither she nor her sister became a Bat Mitzvah. While attending Columbia Presbyterian Medical Center in New



York City to become a Medical Technician, she met Steve.

Growing up in Reading, PA, Steve's suburban area was primarily non Jewish. His family attended the small Reform synagogue there, which was their connection to Jewish life. He recalls only about six Jewish students in high school with him, but he attended Camp Harlam and also became active in the JCC. Just after graduation from Fairleigh Dickenson College in Teaneck with a degree in accounting, Steve attended the party where he met Ilene.

They were married in Teaneck at the Ambassador Catering Hall, about eight months after they met. After a few months of living in Teaneck, they moved to Narberth and then Havertown. While in Havertown, the Bergers met Rabbi Swerdlow, the-then previous Rabbi who also happened to be their lawyer. It was Rabbi Swerdlow who told them about Temple Sholom.

According to Steve, "Temple Sholom has been the biggest constant in our lives other than work and children. We share more history here than anywhere else."

While Ilene was pursuing various jobs, which included working with Steve and also volunteering, Steve worked as an accountant until 1974 when he went into business in real estate. About that time. David Lefcourt asked the Bergers to become involved in the Temple Library. and then asked Steve to join the Temple Board, which he did. Steve says, "Then I was President and Treasurer for a whole bunch of years and now I'm just a plain old board member." He has always been involved in finances, and along with Cindy and Jerry Fastman and Ruth Yaskin, Steve and Ilene were active with Temple Sholom's Scholar-In-Residence program. Ilene was involved in Sisterhood and has always remained a

strong supporter of many Temple activities. She notes that she had been very involved with her children's schools and now is busy with her grandchildren.

All those grandchildren were the motivation for their purchase last summer of a former priest's retirement home on the Jersey Shore in Ventnor. Ilene explains, "We bought it to keep our families together and close." Unfortunately, as part of the home's revitalization, they have been forced to totally gut it and the building won't be ready this summer and probably not until December or January of 2015. They are preparing separate suites for their separate families. Ilene adds, "We love to attend Shabbat Services on the beach in Ventnor in the summer.

When not working, Ilene and Steve are very involved with Technion-Israel Institute of Technology, traveling with the organization at least twice a year nationally and to Israel every year or two. They combine their trips to Israel with trips to Eastern Europe including Austria, Hungary and Czechoslovakia. In April, their plan was to lead a mission of more than 20 people to Jerusalem for Yom HaAtzma'ut.

No matter how much they travel, the Bergers appreciate their spiritual home at Temple Sholom in Broomall. Steve says, "The future at Temple Sholom is bright. There is more going on here than ever before." Ilene concurs, "You hear about Jewish people who are unaffiliated but Temple Sholom is where they should join."

Ilene and Steve also agree that Temple Sholom is constantly evolving, with the only constant being change. In fact, Steve remembers nostalgically when he and Mitch Wolfson converted the former Sanctuary into the building we call The Annex. Although Steve feels strongly that we need a new building, he and Ilene both agree that the issue of not enough space is a good problem, since it's a symptom of congregants and community members being highly involved in Temple Sholom life.

What choices have I made that will enrich my Jewish identity?

"It's not that I'm so smart, it's just that I stay with problems longer."

In this quote, Albert Einstein regards his renowned brilliance simply as perseverance. He attributes his famous intellect to his ability to endure the frustrating obstacles of learning. Learning is an ongoing experience, and it has become evident to me that I wish to be a lifelong learner. Learning is more than a seven hour trudge through school five days a week. It occurs all the time, from the dinner table at home to the lunch tables at school.

Choosing to continue to participate in Jewish studies has enriched my Jewish identity more than I ever thought it would. I am grateful to my parents for enrolling me in programs like Yaldai Shabbat when I was too young to make my own decisions. When presented with the option of halting Jewish learning after becoming a Bat Mitzvah, I never thought I am delighted to be certain I am Jewish. I recently realized twice about continuing my Jewish studies at temple. A weekly dose of Temple Sholom was what I was used to and what I enjoyed, and it seemed like a natural progression to continue on toward Confirmation. Why stop when there is learning to be had?

The easy transition to each new level of my Jewish learning can be attributed to the support I had within Temple Sholom's walls. The congregation at Temple was my family, and my classmates were my friends. Without the fun, exciting, and often intense class discussions and debates about morals, ethics, and the dilemmas Jews encounter, I might have been

hesitant to continue past confirmation. However, as my friends of 16 years and I prepared for our confirmation – and even on the day of our hand-made service – we laughed and teased each other in the way that only the closest family does. It was a happy decision to take another step forward and join postconfirmation.

I can trust a Jewish community to offer insightful opportunities and discussion, and also to offer a group of fellow Jews that share my background as well as a love of debate related to all today's topics. I plan on maintaining and extending my Jewish presence when I go to college by participating in activities offered by the college's Jewish community. I am not afraid of lacking friends when I leave home, because where there are Jews, there is food to bond over and friendships to create.

It's not that I was born the perfect Jew, it's that I chose to continue exploring the different aspects of Judaism.

that I am not Jewish because a parent of mine is Jewish, and I am not Jewish because I want to follow a unique, minority religion. I am Jewish because I have studied Jewish values week after week in educational settings and in so many different contexts, and I agree with them. I would not have reached this conclusion if I had chosen to end my Jewish learning subsequent to my Bat Mitzvah. My choice to continue my Jewish education is an act of perseverance, and in this, I solidified my Jewish identity and am proud to be a part of a group that has been through so much and will continue to create new memories as the future becomes the present.

Shavuot: The Festival of Receiving the Torah

Shavuot is one of the shalosh regalim, the three Pilgrimage Festivals mentioned in the Torah. In ancient days, while the Temple still stood in Jerusalem, Jews would make their way to the Temple to celebrate all three - Sukkot, Pesach and Shavuot.

Shavuot celebrates the giving of the Torah. The Torah tells us that after God freed the Jewish people from slavery in Egypt, after Moses and Miriam led them safely across the Red Sea, they followed Moses to Mount Sinai where God gave them the Torah. According to the Torah, the mountain was covered with smoke, there was thunder and lightning, a great shofar was sounded and God spoke the words of the aseret hadibrot, The Ten Commandments. Some say, God spoke all of the words of Torah to Moses, who transmitted them to the Jewish people.

The result is that the *Torah* belongs to all of us! It is our source of values, wisdom and purpose, our common vocabulary, our narrative, our memory. The *Torah* has bound us together; it is what all Jewish life is based on. The *Torah* is the soul of the Jewish people. As long as we are Jews, the *Torah* is ours and we each have a share in it. It is said that every Jew of every time and place - stood at Mount Sinai when the Law was given. Each of us was a witness to the Revelation; each of us responded with ". . . We will do and we will listen!" God liberated the Jews physically by removing them from slavery and spiritually by giving them the *Torah*. (*Rabbi Nina Beth Cardin*, "*The Tapestry of Jewish Time*".)

It is on the Festival of *Shavuot* that 10th grade students at Temple Sholom renew their commitment to God and the Jewish people. Join us and celebrate with this amazing group of teens as they become Confirmands on *Shavuot*, Tuesday, June 3.
