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From the Desk of Rabbi Peter Rigler

Have you ever looked at your calendar and been overwhelmed? I know I am not the only one! Life can be very busy and occasionally, when we realize how filled our days are, we panic. I felt that pit in my stomach when I saw that the week was coming to travel with American Jewish World Service ("AJWS") to Washington to lobby on the issue of Dominicans of Haitian descent. I am passionate about AJWS and the issues are so important but, now? As a Global Justice Fellow with the AJWS, I was proud to travel to the Dominican Republic ("DR") as one of fifteen rabbis and one cantor, chosen to be part of the incredibly important work AJWS does in the world. During the months we have spent together we have explored issues of moral courage and we were exposed to the transformational efforts of organizations in the DR that address human rights and social justice issues.

We met for example, with AJWS grantees who are advocating for the more than 200,000 Dominicans of Haitian descent who have been rendered stateless and by extension, right-less, who live without citizenship, healthcare and the dignity of being at home in their birthplace. Racial profiling is rampant and racism is an ever-present reality. We met with groups advocating for and supporting equality and rights for LGBTOI and those who are working to end violence against women. I was inspired by those that I met and have kept their stories close to my heart. The time I spent on the trip has helped to open my eyes to how I want to go about Social Justice work. Using many of those I met as a model I realize we need to start local and push where we can have the greatest impact. And as a result, I have formed many wonderful local relationships. In particular, I spent time with our local superintendent. We shared lunch and now are sharing ideas on how we can partner to think about diversity and helping all of our kids feel safe.

So, although overwhelmed with my daily schedule, I knew that with those I had met in the DR so deeply in my heart that I had a responsibility to just go and do what I committed to doing. (A sentence my mother would be very proud of me writing.)

The coming holiday of Shavuot marks the moment of revelation on Mt. Sinai. We are reminded by our tradition that revelation was not a single moment but instead is an ongoing process. When we hear a beautiful piece of music, when we are out for a run, when we are united in prayer or traveling, moments of revelation can fill our souls and help us find something maybe we didn't know was missing. Revelation isn't just the things we learn; it's how we allow those things to change us.

The Sinai moment is our people's quintessential experience of revelation. The Shavuot experience is designed to open us up to the wonders and beauty of our tradition. But, as my teacher, Rabbi Eugene Borowitz shared, "God broadcasts on all channels and we receive only where and when we are attuned."

His message to me was clear, put yourself out of context so you can find your revelation. Don't let the hectic pace of life reduce your grand moments of connection.

I was not expecting our trip to Washington to be one of these moments. I have been there and done that before. I realized quickly this was different. It was the faces and stories that I was now carrying with me as I entered the offices of my representatives. Of the many I carried, Anna a quiet woman with a Haitian parent was most with me. She has struggled to get her ID even though she was on the government list of those who should be able to get one. She went to the election board offices as part of a group of 17, all on the list. The Judge refused to acknowledge them, took Anna's birth certificate, ripped it up, and called in the police to arrest her.

I had the obligation and blessing to share the stories of those we encountered. Did she imagine her story would be shared in the halls of the United States Congress? Along with my parents in the Global Justice Fellowship, I had the chance to help share those stories in hopes to bring change for her and all of those we were honored to meet. I was struck with the contrast of advocating for those who had been silenced in their own country. I was almost brought to tears at the simple notion that I can knock on my representatives' door and they are compelled to answer, even if they don't agree.

As I celebrate Shavuot this year I am strengthened by the experience I shared with AJWS and the revelation experience. Why do Global Social Justice work? Why take the time from a full schedule? I thought much more about changing the lives of others but the revelation is, I am forever changed by this Sinai experience of advocating for those in the Dominican Republic. Thank you, AJWS, for reminding me to not let my schedule AMERICAN dictate moments of holiness! Please **JEWISH** check out American Jewish World WORLD **SERVICE** Service and the amazing work they do

Notes from Cantor Jamie Marx

Of all the life-saving hobbies a person might take up, you might not think of choral singing as one of them. But studies have shown that singing in a choir, regardless of your musical background or the type of choir you sing in, has many specific health benefits. Singing in a choir lowers blood pressure, eases tension from muscles, and can help with both stress management and depression. Group singing also builds community, patience, and critical thinking skills. It's a pretty remarkable set of benefits.

There are a few easy ways to get all these physical and psychological benefits at Temple Sholom. For adults, we have our volunteer choir which meets on Tuesdays from 7:30 – 9 PM. It's a fabulous group of people who come together each week to tackle a variety of Jewish musical pieces. All skill levels are welcome, all levels of Hebrew are welcome, and all levels of Jewish engagement are welcome. There is something to enrich and challenge everyone in the choir, both for those with strong musical training and those who are new to music performance. Most importantly, we try and build a community together that supports each other and creates a unified whole with our discrete voices.

For our teens and tweens, our song leading program is an excellent way to develop and build skills in leadership and teaching, as well as singing and guitar playing. Students may begin song leading as early as 7th grade, or can enter at any point thereafter. Guitar skills, while helpful, are not required. Our program provides training in musical performance (both vocal and guitar), public speaking, Judaism, body



Each musical offering in our community brings rewards both for you and us. Feel free to call me or send an email my way if you might be interested. Your heart, and soul, will thank you.



In April, five amazing women, after months of study with Cantor Marx, Lori Green and others, stood on our bima and became a Bat Mitzvah. Thank you, Bev, Ellen, Karen, Marva and Mary for sharing this amazing journey with our congregation. And Yosher Koach - truly a job well done, ladies.

Marva Glazer - For me, becoming an adult bat mitzvah represents the fulfillment of a desire that for many reasons was not an option for me at 13. Having had no formal religious education, but fortunate enough to have experienced rich Jewish culture within my family, I felt Judaism in my heart.

Becoming an adult bat mitzvah is more meaningful to me, because I chose to do this. I believe that participating in Jewish community will enrich my life and afford me the opportunity for mitzvot.

I admit that in addition to not knowing how to read

Hebrew, I didn't know much about the service. So I am thankful for this opportunity to learn and grow and (finally) achieve this milestone of bat mitzvah. I look forward to continuing my study of Hebrew, expanding my Jewish literacy and participating in Jewish community.

Thank you to my family for their support and encouragement. I would also like to acknowledge especially my sister (in law), Rabbi Sharon Forman-Toll, who always inspires me to be a better person. Thank you Rabbi, Cantor, and Lori for your time and investment in my pursuit of bat mitzvah.

INCLUSION NEWS: NEW SHABBAT

Shabbat in the Park has a new location! Temple Sholom's annual Shabbat in the Park is coming up on Friday, June 2nd, and will be hosted in a new venue that is much more accessible to people with mobility challenges. Be on the lookout for information about the new location, Merry Park on Glendale Road in Havertown.

But why did Temple Sholom move to a new venue in the first place? Because of our commitment to inclusion and access, Temple Sholom has been on the lookout for a venue that is much more conducive to welcoming people with physical challenges, and who were unable to participate in previous Shabbat in the Park services previously held at Ridley Creek State Park. Finding an accessible site with access to electricity for our microphone system has been challenging. The new site has paved access areas from the parking lot into the park, and there are paved walkways around the park as well as access to the bathrooms. There is also ramp access to the pavilion which houses the picnic tables. This means our community members, of all ages, using canes, walkers, scooters, and wheelchairs, or who have difficulty walking will have safe access to the park, the BBQ dinner, and the Shabbat service. We are really looking forward to welcoming Temple Sholom members who have not been able to attend Shabbat in the Park in the past due to concerns about safety. There is some Handicapped parking and we plan to create additional spaces to accommodate anyone who wants to come.

Our community benefits from the full participation of all of our congregants, including those with special needs. Please remember that you can always request an accommodation, and we will do our best to provide this for you, a family member, or guest. 
IMPORTANT NEWS FROM YOUR SISTERHOOD



People who cannot walk the 20 minutes from the entrance of the park Rd. Turn left on Bishop Hollow Rd. till you get to the to the meeting location (it's less than a mile) and/or have a handicap tag, may be able to drive to the handicap parking area and join us for the meeting. Note: Bishop Hollow Rd ends at Chapel Hill Rd. and the name changes to N. Ridley Creek Rd.

An alternate route from the Temple: Go up Media Line Rd to Gradyville and take Gradyville to Bishop Hollow bridge where you turn right for the parking lot and entrance to the park.

PARKING: You can park near the entrance, if there is space. If not, look for parking on Chapel Hill Rd. The car needs to be on the dirt area on the side of this road, not on the paved area. There is no parking on N. Ridley Creek Rd. or Bishop Hollow Rd.

Carpooling is strongly recommended due to limited parking.



AROUND RIMON!

Becoming.... a Kehillah Kadosha – A Holy Community!

Why did I include the world "Becoming..." in the title of this reflection? Aren't we at Temple

Sholom already a *Kehillah Kadosha*? The answer is "yes"... and "no". Have I confused you? Let me take a step back. I am often struck when people refer to our movement as "Reformed". We are not "Reformed", we are "Reform". The word reform is a verb. As a movement and as a synagogue we are always are reforming to balance the values of our faith with the challenges of our times. As we are reforming we are also becoming.

As a Temple Sholom *kehillah kadosha*, the makeup of our congregational membership is ever evolving. Welcoming new families, and yes, saying goodbye to some families is a constant. Yet we strive to bring all our families into the heart of our congregation. Whether it be our *Rimon* families, our Hilltoppers, our youth groups, our special committees or our membership as a whole we are constantly recalibrating what it means to be a *kehillah kadosha*.

During the last trimester of our *Rimon* year we dipped our toes into a new area. In an attempt to break down some of the invisible boundaries within our Temple Sholom family each of our learning groups – *Bonim* (K - gr. 1), *Chaverim* (gr. 2 - 3) and *Olim* (gr. 4 - 5) partnered with a committee within our synagogue family. It was an experiment – one with a fabulous outcome!

Under the leadership of our *Bonim* (K - gr. 1) team (Anna Haywood, Robin Matthews, Galen Newman) and our Membership chair, Laurie Browngoehl, our children learned the Jewish value of welcoming and created welcome bags and artwork to welcome families to our *kehillah kadosha*.

Our *Chaverim* (gr. 2 - 3) team (Eileen Buckwalter, Bev Cylinder, Donna Hendel) worked closely with our Mitzvah Corp chair, Barbara Barr to create baby blankets for new babies to our congregational family, placemats and centerpieces for our congregational second seder, and baked goods and soup for those in our community who are ill.




ToaSTY has been hard at work in the past couple months. In March, we assisted Cantor Marx and Lawrence Husick in Earth Hour, a resounding
