FROM THE DESK OF RABBI PETER RIGLER

Dear Friends,

*To everything there is a season
And a time to every purpose under heaven*
Ecclesiastes 3:1

Several weeks ago I was with a group of Jewish teenagers, including some of our own, in Costa Rica in a very isolated village. We had traveled five hours from the nearest town to a very remote area to help build a school. We lived in small shacks just feet from the Caribbean Ocean. The camp was very limited in size and facilities. Each morning we found ourselves up at the crack of dawn and quickly became part of the natural cycle of time that we so easily lose when we sleep in our homes and darken our rooms. I found it even more amusing that I was telling the students it was time to head back to their beds at 8:00 p.m. because it was so dark and we were all so tired.

This is the time of year that we as a Jewish community consider time in new ways. We feel the ticking clock to the end of the New Year and see the chance to rewind and start over again with the coming Holy Days. We ask ourselves the questions of life: How did we manage time? How do each of us relate to time? How do we begin our days, and then meet our appointments as the day stretches out? Some of us are blessed with reliable biological clocks that rouse us from sleep and shake us into each new day. But most of us rely on alarm clocks or preset cell phones or coffee makers whose bells and whistles, music and

aroma interrupt and demand the end of our deep or fitful sleep.

Throughout the day, most of us are checking our watches or clocks on the wall or on our computers, consulting a wide range of devices to help us order our days, meet our commitments, begin and end projects, and take care of bodily needs. How often have we looked at the time and exclaimed, "I need to eat!" or "look what time it is! I need to go to sleep!"

How different was our ancestors' relationship to time! Every day, they measured their days by the sun's journey across the sky, and every evening they watched the moon rise. They enumerated each month by the moon's predictable and marvelous phases, watching as this far away light expanded and contracted, waxing and waning, month after month, season after season. Too many of us have lost our connection to the natural cycle of time. In just a few weeks, on Rosh Hashanah, we Jews reclaim our relationship to time. We intentionally gather together to hear the sound of the shofar, to awaken to the possibilities of presence and service in the year that lies ahead. My hope is we will use our time wisely! We hope during the coming year we will spend time together in community, prayer, support and time of joy!

In Pursuit: New Jewish Hard Rock

The day after Labor Day seems like an auspicious day for beginning a new venture. For many, it's the day that the kids start school again or perhaps the unofficial start of Fall. This year, it's the day my first album, *In Pursuit*, is officially released.

In Pursuit is a six-track album of Jewish hard rock. The settings showcase a variety of approaches to our prayers: some use the words of the prayer book, some feature original lyrics, and some are a mix of the two. And while I don't pretend I'm the first or the last person to set "Shalom Rav" to music, I wanted to write an album in a musical style I think hasn't really been heard in the non-Orthodox Jewish world before. Hard rock is a musical "language" I've lived with for more than twenty years, but it's not one we hear Jewish music set to.

As part of the release of my album, I launched a blog series with friends and colleagues to talk about the intersection of rock music and Judaism. I encourage




you to check it out and read about what rock can mean in relation to Jewish music and Jewish prayer.

While the album is a new creation, I've been writing music longer than I've even thought about being a cantor. But songwriting and composing is more than just a hobby to me. It's part of my work as a cantor, sharing my musical voice with the wider Jewish world. My hope is my success as a composer will be seen as our success. I don't want songwriting and performing to be full-time work; I have a day job and I like it! But the opportunity to share my music with the world means a lot to me and I hope you will come along with me on the journey.

NEW YEAR'S GREETINGS FROM OUR TEMPLE PRESIDENT



Four years ago, I met with Rabbi at the diner to discuss my move up to President of Temple Sholom. The discussion is significant, as I converted to Judaism eight short years before. My questions were carefully

prepared and prioritized. The first two questions were 1) "What is your vision for Temple Sholom?" and 2) "Do you intend to be at Temple Sholom in five years to realize that vision?" "I thought I was set...."

The joke was on me, last year Rabbi started his two month sabbatical a few days before I became President. In a way, it made me a better President as I relied heavily on Board members, volunteers, Cantor Marx, Abbey Krain, Lori Green and Brooke Zeitz to assure that Temple Sholom continued to provide our services and move forward into the New Year.

60th Celebration Begins: In June, we had a fabulous start to our Temple Sholom @ 60! celebration year. On a special Friday night, we shared Shabbat Dinner with over 130 congregants. We installed our Board members, and citations were presented from several branches of Local and State Government. Saturday night we continued the celebration with a Cabaret. We laughed and cheered at our first ever Dessert Auction. Melissa and Rabbi promise to repeat the bakery auction.

We presently number 441 family units. Our membership numbers have remained flat. This is our challenge, as the cost of everything increases. Our dues provides 47% of our income. *Or L'Atid*, our annual appeal, achieved 80% over our goal. We thank the Past Presidents, led by Emily Mendell and Executive Director, Abbey Krain for our wild success.

Our Legacy or *L'Dor V Dor* Program, led by Art Zabell, surpassed our goal for this year this past April. Twenty-three families signed a letter of intent to include Temple Sholom in our Estate Planning. Join our Legacy Program by calling Art, any board member, or the office staff to find out more about *L'Dor V Dor* Program.

We were sorry to accept the resignation of our Executive Vice President, Mark Rubinoff. He has given us many years of his talent and expertise. I am pleased to announce that in compliance with our

Bylaws, the Board elected a new Executive Vice President to fill the one year left of the two year term. As a result of our General Board election:

The Senior Vice President moves into the Executive Vice President position.

A Member-At-Large moves into the Senior Vice President position.

A Trustee move into the Member-At-Large position.

Laurie Browngoehl will serve as our Executive Vice President from 2017 – 2018. Margaret Husick has been elected to the position of Senior Vice President to complete the 2017 - 2018 term. Trustee, Eric Lieberman is elected to the position of Member-At-Large for 2017 – 2018. *Todah Rabbah* to our Trustees for agreeing to take on this sacred commitment.

This past year, our board focused on Jewish values. The D'Var Torah at many Board meetings was linked to the Jewish value studied. Twenty minutes of development helped the Board think about audacious hospitality, *Brit Avodah*, sacred work, treating others with respect and giving generously. We studied URJ Resolutions related to immigration and established a Rapid Response Policy. The Board successfully negotiated a new five year contract with Rabbi Peter Rigler. Our year culminated in our Leadership Dinner with URJ President, Rabbi Rick Jacobs.

We worked hard to provide experiences that created a *Kehillah Kadosha* including the Scholar-in-Residence Weekend featuring Imam Malik Mubashshir, the ADL Walk Against Hate, Alan Goodis Musician-in-Residence Weekend, Shabbat -in-the-Park and Maya's Bat Mitzvah Celebration. In addition Sisterhood, Brotherhood, Hilltoppers, Women's Spirituality, Conversations with Men and Youth Group provided memorable experiences for Temple Sholom. We offered so many more events, activities and programs that I do not have time to list them all. We thank you, our leaders, volunteers and sponsors for your herculean efforts.

We updated the classrooms this year for *Rimon* and Preschool with fresh paint and window treatments providing a much needed lift and update to our classrooms and hallway.

Our *Rimon* program continues to grow. The *Rimon Noar* program has been

selected to participate in the nationally prestigious "**Better Together**" Program. "**Better Together**" is a fully-funded, two-year program designed to encourage relevant and meaningful interaction between teens and senior citizens.

Preschool continues to provide excellent experiential learning for our youngest children. They created a butterfly garden, made their own Haggadot, honored their moms at Muffins with Mom and celebrated Israel's Independence Day with an intergenerational event. Sandy Barth conducted a review and analysis of The Satell Family Growth and Development Fund goals and use. What is clear is that a relationship between Satell money availability and enrollment exists.

This coming year we are focused on several areas. We are focused on developing a 2020 Vision through a new Strategic Plan. We are working to increase membership, enrollment in Preschool and B'nai Mitzvah retention. The Membership Committee is welcoming our new members with a welcome package. The Security Committee is finalizing an updated Temple Sholom Emergency Response Plan. Preschool offered Story Hour three times this summer. If you know someone who might want to be part of our Temple Sholom community, please invite them to join us. Word of mouth remains our best advertising. Board Development will look at the Jewish world outside of Temple Sholom by inviting speakers from the URJ, World Union of Progressive Judaism, ARZA and Federation.

Join us for our Gala **OH! What A Night – 60 Years of Temple Sholom on Broadway** on Sunday, November 5. All proceeds will benefit the replacement of our 60 year old heating, ventilation, air conditioning and electrical systems. We rely on you for our success.

It is an honor to serve as your president working with so many professionals, volunteers and congregants. *Todah Rabbah* to our clergy, staff, teachers and volunteers for working so hard to make Temple Sholom "the place to be" in a very complicated world. We welcome you to our new year 5778.

WHY THE GALA?

"The Lord spoke to Moses saying: 'Speak to the children of Israel, and have them take for Me an offering; from every person

whose heart inspires him to generosity, you shall take My offering...

And they shall make Me a sanctuary and I will dwell in their midst." Exodus 25

Exodus 25 provides not only a lusciously detailed description of the sanctuary that Moses is instructed to build, but marks what was likely the first fundraiser for the Jewish people. And while I certainly don't have the hubris to compare myself with Moses, I did want to take a moment to speak to you about our current fundraiser.

Two years ago we brought you the Capitol Steps in order to raise the funds necessary to put a new roof on our sanctuary and, with your very generous support, we accomplished our goal. Today, we are again asking for your support in accomplishing a need as critical to our infrastructure as the replacement of the roof was.

As many of you may know, the Temple's heating and air-conditioning system is as old as our building, in need of constant repair and extremely inefficient - costing us significantly more to operate. Frankly, the system is beyond the point where more repairs make any economic sense.

The building in which our Temple Sholom community prays, teaches, gathers, and celebrates has continued to thrive for 60 years through the generosity of our members. As Temple Sholom embarks upon a momentous milestone - our Diamond Jubilee year - we are so proud of all that we have accomplished and

look forward to a bright and promising future. Importantly, we want to ensure that we have an accessible, welcoming and vibrant space for all of our members for many, many years to come.

And that is why, as we approach the start of the New Year, we are reaching out to everyone in the congregation for help in supporting the much-needed upgrades to our electrical and HVAC systems. 

SANCTUARY MINHAG (CUSTOMS) AT TEMPLE SHOLOM

At Temple Sholom, we observe the following customs (*minhag*) regarding entering the sanctuary during services:

People are not permitted to enter the sanctuary when:

- *the congregation is standing*
- *the ark is open*
- *the Rabbi is speaking*
- *the choir is standing up and singing*
- *or at times that would be disrespectful – at the discretion of the sanctuary usher.*

It is recommended that children under 12 years of age attend Family Services which are held for those families with children younger than 12 years old and who wish to come as a family. We ask that parents be responsible for the behavior of their children.

CELEBRATING THE HIGH HOLY DAYS AT TEMPLE SHOLOM

Dear Temple Members:

Erev Rosh Hashanah begins on Wednesday, September 20. In keeping with the recommendations of the Religious Practices Committee, the Board has developed the following Temple Policies regarding the High Holy Days. Please keep in mind that the High Holy Days are a time when most of our members attend services, and our space is limited. Further, they are a quiet and reflective time.

High Holy Days Policies and Procedures

To assist all congregants with questions or concerns, Ushers will be stationed throughout the Sanctuary, lobby and parking lot.

All congregants must bring your personalized, nontransferable tickets to each service. Your ticket is required for entrance. Tot Services on Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, as well as the evening service on Rosh Hashanah do not require a ticket.

Our Temple building, as well as the doors to the Sanctuary will open one hour before the service begins. This allows us to prepare for your arrival.

You may hold seats for your immediate family only.

Once Services have begun, entry into the Sanctuary will be at the discretion of the ushers. It is our policy that no one is to be admitted while the congregation is standing, when the Ark is open or during the Rabbi's sermon or Cantor's Sermon Anthem.

If you bring cell phones, beepers and other electronic devices into the building, please make certain they are set to "inaudible."

Tickets for High Holy Day Services will be issued to members in good standing only.

A limited number of guest tickets are available to purchase for relatives who live outside of our service area. The fee for guest tickets is \$200 each. Please contact the Temple Office to purchase guest tickets.

According to Temple policy, children of member families, 25 years and older, are independent adults. If adult children live outside of our service area, a

guest ticket may be purchased for them. Children who are 24 years or younger may attend services as part of the family unit and will receive a ticket in the mail.

The Family Service is recommended for families who wish to attend services together with children under 12 years of age. So that the Family Services may be fulfilling for everyone, we ask that parents be responsible for the behavior of their children. It is recommended that Adult Services are for those congregants 12 years and older.

Babysitting is available during Adult services on Rosh Hashanah morning and on Yom Kippur morning. Registration is required in advance. Contact the Temple Office regarding the fee and to sign up.

Family and Tot Services

We invite all families with toddlers and preschool children to attend a special service in the Sanctuary on Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. In order to allow us to set up for Adult Services, we will ask all to leave the Sanctuary when Tot Services are finished.

Parking on the Temple Grounds

Parking spaces are limited and are available on a first-come, first-served basis. When our property is full, you will be allowed to drop off your passengers at the door and then park in the Little League parking lot at the corner of Church Lane and Marple Road. Cars illegally parked in the neighborhood will be ticketed. All others may park in the large lot in the back. There will be no parking on the grass or on any blacktop that is not striped. When parking on the street, please be sure not to block our neighbors' driveways. The Marple Township Police will patrol, assist and help direct traffic.



Parking for People with Physical Disabilities

The smaller parking lot at the front of the Temple, spaces along the side and in front of the Annex will be reserved for physical disability and emergency parking. Spaces are limited. To request Disabled Parking, you must be a driver with physical

disabilities and have a Person with Disabilities License Plate or a Disability placard to display in the car. Parking reservations will be honored up to 30 minutes before the start of services. After that time, the parking space will be released to other congregants. We appreciate your respect of our parking lot ushers and hope you arrive on time.

Wheelchair/Limited Mobility/Special Needs Seating

Requests for special seating will be accepted on a first-come, first-serve basis. These special seats will be honored up to 30 minutes before the start of services. After that time, the seats will be released to other congregants. Please be respectful of our ushers and arrive on time.

We will not be able to accept dues payments at High Holy Day Services. Please make all arrangements with Abbey Krain, Executive Director, at 610-356-5165, ext. 103 or Betsy Blackburn-Goslin, Temple Bookkeeper, at 610-356-5165, ext. 111 prior to [September 11](#).

All area College Students are welcome to join us for all services. Please call the Office to register their name(s). College or university ID are required.





CONVERSATIONS WITH MEN



We Have Another Great Year of Conversations in Store!

The Conversations with Men group started in response to Women's Spirituality. So, you could also call this group "Men's Spirituality."

This coming school year will be the 6th year for Conversations with Men!

Each year we center our conversations around a particular aspect of Judaism. This past year at our monthly meetings we discussed a wide variety of subjects through the perspective of the Zohar, or the book of Divine Radiance. We learned about the history of the Zohar and how it was a catalyst for Jewish Mysticism or Kabbalah.

This coming year of 2017-18 our conversations will center around the Talmud. The word Talmud means 'instruction' and it is the collection of Jewish law and tradition from both the Mishnah and the Gemara.

The Mishna is the core of the Talmud and consists of the collection of oral laws compiled and written down around 200 A.D. by Rabbi Judah ha-Nasi. The Gemara is the main body of the Talmud, consisting of a record of ancient rabbinical debates about the interpretation of the Mishna and constituting the primary source of Jewish religious law.
