

From the Desk of Rabbi Peter Rigler



Israel is only a few weeks away from celebrating 70 years of statehood. I am a passionate Zionist who has had enough! I wrote these words and would like to share them with you so you understand my thoughts on our current situation. I would be happy to talk more if you have questions or thoughts; I encourage you to send an

Ambassador Nikki Haley criticized the Palestinian leadership saying they are, "Lacking courage and will to seek peace." She is right, we need to be honest. For too long the Palestinians have lacked strong leadership that can advocate for its people and make a better life. The words of Abba Eban, "The Palestinians never miss an opportunity to miss an opportunity" are as true today as when he uttered them years ago.

It is clear to me that they are not the only ones who lack courage or the ability to lead. We are dealing with an American and Israeli government that both lack courage to make peace in the Middle East a reality and who are becoming so extreme on multiple policy issues that the time for peace and a better life will never come.

Let me respond to the anger of some who may see my words and ask why I have a right to use my voice on this issue. I am not Israeli, my parents are not Israeli and I have only a few family members who live in Israel. I am not an Israeli citizen and I have never served in the army. I am a Rabbi deeply committed to the existence and safety of Israel. I am not on either polar side of the issues, I find myself in the middle. Believing that the Palestinian situation is untenable and also unwavering in my support for the people of Israel that deserve safety, I do not believe the situation is caused only by the Israeli government. How do you make peace with an elusive partner?

I believe with a full heart the existence of the state of Israel is, and will continue to be, essential. I have traveled to Israel dozens of times, I have lived in Israel for over three years, working with teens, teaching in an Israeli school, studying, working with Ethiopian and Russian immigrants, and lived on an absorption center. I have been a block away from a terrorist attack and experienced the carnage that resulted. I have sat on a bus in fear that we would be the next victims. I have also organized and implemented Israel trips that have brought hundreds to visit and connect with Israel. I am involved in various Israel groups here at home and often share my passion for Israel. I am an advocate for continued American foreign aid of over three billion dollars yearly, the second highest to any nation in the world that we give assistance to. I have lobbied, written and called all in support of our special relationship with Israel. I am disgusted by BDS, am angry about the anti-Semitism that

Palestinian children are taught and I know that Israel has, in the past, tried to do better.

So, yes, I have a right to speak! How many American Jews feel angry or disconnected and have no relationship with Israel? I hear from people often who are no longer worried about being left wing or right wing, they simply are walking away from Israel. What is the future of this relationship? Yes, the PR problem is one Israel has had for many years. The reality on the ground is that the Palestinian people have no hope. If you take away hope, what do you think the chances for a lasting peace are? The Palestinian people want to live a normal life! Yes, I know the comments that life is better for Arabs in Israel than anywhere else but, how long are we going to tell ourselves that story? The Arab Israeli people want to live a normal life! Arab Israeli schools are not funded in the same way as their neighbors, the roads don't look the same and the infrastructure is crumbling. Yes, Arabs can be in the Knesset but, who has ever been brave enough to include them in a coalition? It has never happened. The Palestinian issue is beyond challenging but, when people don't have running water, electricity or medicine how can they see a partner for peace in Israel or the United States. Yes, money has been wasted and squandered but, it is not lost on me that Israel can do more. Technology flowing out of Israel is changing the world, so let's use the ingenuity to find ways to improve life for people in spite of the lack of leadership they are struggling with.

Even the Palestinian people feel deserted by their leadership. But, where are the leaders like Rabin, Shamir and Peres. The Netanyahu government has pulled so far to the right hoping to bury the issue in the sand. The Israeli government is much more interested in appeasing the ultra-Orthodox and others to hold their coalition together. They think we don't notice that the peace struggle has not been on the radar screen in years. Israel's strategy seems to cut the Palestinian people off and hope they disappear, but it is not going to happen. If you want to say we are not ready to talk peace fine, let's talk human rights.

When I lived in Israel in 1994, I saw what it was like as peace seemed a reality. Peace was granted, but it was also a scary time with a spike in terrorist attacks from extremists. I met countless Palestinians and Israelis who believed it was so close to a reality and it was. Israelis and Palestinians started working together and knew each other. This is no longer the case. The wall that has kept Israel safe has made the divide so deep. So many Israelis now say they don't even know a Palestinian.

When you are in a relationship and love someone you are allowed to criticize them. I love Israel and I am angry at its policies on so many levels. The challenges and lack of

"Honey From the Rock"

Music genres are like foreign countries. Each one brings with it cultural baggage, its own language, and its own flavors. An unfamiliar genre, like an unfamiliar country, can be exciting and invigorating. But it can be disorienting

and off-putting too! When we're talking about music for worship, the conversation gets another layer of complication. Rituals require consistency in order to work — that's what makes them rituals! A certain amount of change keeps things fresh, but too much change and you lose any sense of prayer.

On March 23 at 7:00 PM we're having a rock Shabbat service, and all of these issues are bouncing around in my head. The music will be a little louder, a hint grittier, but many of the melodies will be familiar. We'll sing many of the same texts that we'd sing on a regular Friday night. Rock Shabbat is also an opportunity to push ourselves a little bit out of our comfort zone. It's a chance to explore another entryway into prayer. For some, the music will be thrilling, immediately translatable, and uplifting in a new way. For others, the music will be challenging, unfamiliar, or perhaps will feel even a little unnecessary.

As I have said in these pages, as well as on the bima and in conversation, I truly believe that rock music can bring as transcendent an experience as formal "art music" or gentler pop and folk styles. I invite you to come on this journey with me and explore some new musical territory in our sanctuary. If rock music is a foreign country, then consider me the tour guide.

Dear Friends,

What a winter we have had. I am so happy and excited that Spring is around the corner.

The harsh winter cold, along with the wind, snow, and some icy days have had an impact on our Temple building. We have faced some

weather related issues with our heating systems, a burst pipe and some leaks (not in our roof, but in surrounding sill plates, siding and fascia). All of these have been repaired. Although, not related to the weather, we have had some issues in our kitchen as well this winter, including a dishwasher needing repairs and the need for a new refrigerator. The refrigerator was from 1975, and it definitely served us well.

A special thank you to our donors and to volunteers who helped in the process of dealing with these issues. moral leadership are not limited to the issues around the peace process; it is a lack of moral leadership. Thirty-eight thousand asylum seekers are about to be sold to Rwanda so Israel can skirt the issues involved. Ship them out, it will then not be our problem and IT will be gone. How can I ignore this?

How about the question of Jerusalem as Israel's capital? The city is already as divided as any city on earth has ever been. People don't live, travel, work or know each other. To declare Jerusalem as the capital of Israel is true but, misses the point! The Palestinians live there and view it as a future capital as well. We can't pretend they don't exist. Yet, the option to have a shared Jerusalem has been pulled off the table.

What kind of State does Israel want to be? With our history of tragedy and our teachings of compassion and love are we going to shut our eyes to those in need? I will continue to love Israel, share Israel, travel to Israel, and celebrate the dream of Zionism. I will also say loudly that Israel can do better and those of us that love Israel need to do something about it. The relationship much of the American Jewish community has with Israel is collapsing; the Zionist dream is in peril. How does isolating Israel with the United States make for a better future? We need to use the pressure of our financial resources, voting and lobbying and make a clear statement that we can do better. Sadly, what I see from our American administration are policies and talk that will only make this more of a distant dream. The Right wing Israeli government feels emboldened to dismiss the Palestinian people. Ambassador Haley, where is the courage from this administration and the government of Israel? Don't talk about courage, be courageous!





All women members of Temple Sholom in Broomall are welcome to attend our monthly meetings. There are NO DUES . . . just come and enjoy the programs as often as it is convenient.

Here's a taste of our programs from the last two months. In December, Rabbi Shelly Barnathan presented a program on Miracles – Readings for Chanukah. She brought readings from Rabbi Sheila Peltz Weinberg, Rebbe Nachman of Breslov, Rabbi Nina Beth Cardin and Rabbi Yael Levy. We explored what it means to recognize life's miracles. The lights of Chanukah call us to recognize miracles in various places and at various times, and ultimately in every day.

In January, Susan Farber and Gloria Kresch introduced us to Abraham Joshua Heschel's quotes that expressed his reflections on prayer. We focused our discussion on how these quotes spoke to us. We explored the Hashkiveynu prayer in music – listening to various cantors singing the prayer – including our own Jamie Marx, and how these various renditions evoked different emotions in us. We then shared some ways we can make prayer richer for us using specific prayers. We ended the evening by reading a poem written by Heschel, and listening to a cantor who put it to music.

On Wednesday, March 28th we will welcome Anna Marx as we gather in the Temple library at 7:30 PM. We look forward to spending the evening with Anna when she will bring her interesting program on "An Ancient Faith in a 21st Century World." Don't miss this opportunity to learn and discover what will unfold.

Please mark your calendars for Wednesday, April 25th when Rabbi Shelly Barnathan will present to Women's Spirituality the very timely subject . . . "Between Pesach and Shavuot - The Omer - a period for Refining our Inner Qualities."

The period of 7 weeks between Pesach and Shavuot is called the Omer. It is a special gift of time in the Jewish calendar which allows us to go inside ourselves and to "shine up" our souls. We will come together on April 25 at Women's Spirituality to learn about the Omer, to refine our inner qualities, and to "shine up" our souls!

AROUND RIMON



In January, I had the privilege of attending the annual ARJE (Association of Reform Jewish Educators) in Seattle. For me, this was one of the most inspiring, professional experiences I have had. I had the opportunity to learn, laugh, and share alongside over 250 Reform Jewish educators from around the country. I returned rejuvenated, full

of new learning, and, of course, lots of great ideas. Yet, as I continued to reflect on the experience, one comment by a colleague kept niggling in my brain..."our children are congregants in their own right as much as our adults."

Engaging with Temple Sholom Committees

During our second trimester of Sunday *Rimon*, our students demonstrated that they are truly congregants at Temple Sholom. Each of our groups -Bonim (K/1st gr.), *Chaverim* ($2^{nd}/3^{rd}$ gr.) and *Olim* ($4^{th}/5^{th}$ gr.) learned alongside a different committee of Temple Sholom. Our students learned about the work of the committee and came to know members of the committee. Framing their work through the lens of Jewish values, our students engaged in the work of the committee, as well!

The *Bonim* (K/1) team worked with Mitzvah Corp on a number of projects including decorating "onesies" for new babies, creating get well cards, and preparing special "soup jars" for people who are sick.

The *Chaverim* (2/3) team interviewed members of the Library Committee learning about the work they do. *Cheverim* students created and illustrated a cookbook and made decorations for the library.

Working with the Budget Committee the *Olim* (4/5) team sought to examine, reflect upon, and refine the *Rimon* budget. The *Olim* team broke into interest groups to examine how they could find ways to include additional technology, sports, and trips to the *Rimon* budget. Students presented their research and recommendations, rooted in Jewish values, to the Budget Committee.

We are so grateful to members of these committees for their time working with our faculty and our *Rimon* children and/or attending student presentations ... they truly helped our students feel like full congregations of Temple Sholom!

I will donate them to the kids in the shelters through The Homeless Health Initiative.

Introduction to Talmud

With Rabbi Rigler



The Talmud (Hebrew for "study") is one of the central works of the Jewish people. It is the record of rabbinic teachings that spans a period of about six hundred years, beginning in the first century C.E. and continuing through the sixth and seventh centuries C.E. The rabbinic teachings of the Talmud explain in great detail how the commandments of the Torah are carried out. For example, the Torah teaches us that one is prohibited from working on the Sabbath. But what does that really mean? There is no detailed definition in the Torah of "work." The Talmudic tractate called Shahhat therefore devotes an entire chapter to the meaning of work and the various categories of prohibited work. During the three sessions, you will get a taste for what the Talmud is and how it works






