FROM THE DESK OF RABBI RIGLER



Dear Friends,

The relationship between the liberal American Jewish community is at a difficult crossroads. We are struggling to understand how we can stay connected with Israel even if we may be uncomfortable with

policies of the government. Recognizing this as we celebrate Yom Haatzmaut, Israel Independence Day this year I want to take a step back in Israel's history.

From the end of World War I, the British governed the Land of Israel, known as Palestine, under a charter called the British Mandate. In 1947, the United Nations voted to partition Palestine into two countries - an Arab state and a Jewish state. The Jewish state would be smaller and contain not a single Jewish holy site, including the Western Wall. The Jewish government in Palestine accepted the decision of the UN. The Arab nations did not. David Ben Gurion wanted to declare a state on May 14, 1948, the day before the British were to leave and the partition plan was to be put into effect. But many in his government opposed him. Some felt it was too dangerous that a tiny Jewish state would not survive the inevitable incursion of massive Arab armies. The orthodox Jews opposed him because they wanted the state to follow traditional Jewish law. Ben Gurion however, was convinced that the time was right. He compromised with the orthodox and persuaded enough of the others so that on May 14, as the Sabbath was approaching, Ben Gurion declared the new State of Israel to be born. As predicted, the Arab armies attacked and the War of Independence began. Imagine the pressure and stress on Ben Gurion! The fate of the Jewish state rested with his decision, and it was by no means certain that the Jews would survive the coming war. Yet, Ben Gurion had faith in his instinct and in his people, and now 71 years later, we celebrate the State of Israel.

The Holocaust had ended only three years before, and Ben Gurion knew that for the Jewish people to survive they needed a country of their own, despite the odds. Jews from across the world have found refuge and home. While the complications on the ground are many, I pray that Israel will continue to thrive as it figures out how to handle these complex issues. The courage of Ben Gurion is a guide for us all, his

courage and bravery in the face of unrelenting stress and pressure and challenge created the miracle that is Israel. Today we marvel at his courage. As we confront our own challenges and trials, take inspiration from Ben Gurion and his willingness to persevere even in the face of difficulties. Am Yisrael Chai! The people of Israel live!

ENTHUSIASM / ZERIZUT

The Hebrew word that can be translated as “zeal,” “alacrity” or “promptness.” *Zerizut* is the spark that catalyzes us to quickly and effectively do the things that need to be done, even if we don't feel like doing them.

The reason it is the foundation of all other traits is because without *zerizut*, one will not work on and improve his/her other traits. *Zerizut* is the get-up-and-go that enables us to pray, perform mitzvot, learn Torah and do good deeds. As fun as a life of lounging and relaxation can look from the outside, a life without purpose, goals and meaning is usually an unhappy one.



NOTES FROM CANTOR JAMIE MARX

This summer, I'll be spending two weeks serving as faculty at the URJ 6 Points Creative Arts Academy (CAA) in West Chester. CAA is an overnight summer camp like Camp Harlam, offering Jewish youth an exploration of their heritage and tradition through an artistic lens.

I was deeply affected by the week I spent on faculty at CAA last summer. I wore my CAA bracelet for months afterward, both as a memento of my experience and a reminder that Judaism and community-building can transform lives. While all of our Reform camps create safe spaces for personal and spiritual development, there is something special and unique about what CAA offers.

It's a remarkable group of students who would choose a Jewish arts summer camp. Jo-Ellen Unger, CAA's incredible director, told me that the vast majority of the students at CAA were experiencing their first immersive Jewish summer program. There is something about offering an arts program that drew in young Jews who had never before chosen a Jewish summer camp. That creates an incredible opportunity

for the faculty and staff to make an impact on their Jewish lives that they hadn't experienced before.

At the same time, the campers are all artists, engaged enough in their craft to pursue high quality learning over summer break. We weren't just helping them grow as Jews or as artists, we were helping them connect their Judaism to their arts. In my own journey, learning that I could bring together my love of music with my love of Judaism is what led me to the cantorate. It was such a joy to show them that these two parts of their soul didn't have to be separate parts of their lives.

As with all of our Reform summer camps, CAA created a safe space for personal and spiritual exploration. I was deeply touched to get to know a few campers who shared feelings of being lost in their schools, left out in their communities, and disconnected from their synagogue — but they found a home at CAA. They found acceptance among peers, strength within themselves, and an understanding of what Judaism can offer their souls.

A MESSAGE FROM THE BOARD: RIMON

5780 – Looking to Next Year at *Rimon*

Here at *Rimon*, we deeply cherish our children, the leaders of tomorrow. A primary goal, one held by many synagogues, is to work on keeping our youth with us throughout their K-12 years. It is not uncommon for many synagogues to lose a significant portion of teenagers following their B'nei Mitzvah. Here at Temple Sholom, we strive to be different. Our teens enrich everything we do, while we, as a community, provide them with deeply meaningful, wholesome experiences in the midst of a sometimes tumultuous, ever-changing world.

How do we currently engage our post-B'nei Mitzvah youth in middle school and high school programs and experiences? We currently have our superb Gesherim, *Rimon Noar*, Confirmation, and B'Yachad programs. In addition, we offer students the opportunity to participate in the choir and/or youth group, as well as the opportunity to work in our Madrikim program. Presently, approximate 65% of our eligible Temple Sholom teens are engaged in one or more of the above programs. This year, 15 teens are participating in our Madrikim program. Six serve as song leaders and four are working to acquire their certification in the Teen Assistant Program (TAP) at the Jewish Learning Venture of Gratz College. As part of their training, the latter four students serve as “wrap-arounds” to enhance support for some of our K-5 children with special behavioral and/or emotional needs. In general, we are looking to engage 75% of our eligible Temple Sholom teens next year.

An anonymous donor has recently given Rabbi Peter Rigler a special financial gift. Using part of that gift, Rabbi Rigler and Lori Green intend to focus on growing our teenage enrollment, with the creation of three new programs. In creating these programs, we are working with representatives from Impact Now – The Jewish Education Project. Impact Now was a yearlong study developed to tell the “Story of Impact” of innovative models already created by The Coalition of Innovating Congregations at The Jewish Education Project and to support congregations in continuing to develop these and other models. This study worked with 12 congregations, including one in our local area, to identify the impact and the perceived value of new innovations and models of Jewish education, and included parent focus groups and one-to-one interviews.

First, we plan to create a Day of Justice and Righteousness on the day before Sukkot. Students, teachers, and clergy will come together to focus on social impact issues, culminating in an art project, which will grace the walls of our Temple Sholom sukkah for the duration of the holiday.

Secondly, we look forward to creating more meaningful and engaging B'nei Mitzvah project opportunities by inviting our students to engage in rich experiential education--meaningful voluntary community service in projects close to their hearts. Hopefully, such experiences will then lay a solid foundation for a lifetime of relevant volunteer work.

Finally, we are creating a yearlong curriculum, focusing on the pursuit of social justice. We hope to closely examine our Jewish background as it intertwines with current events of the day. The year will culminate with a phenomenal Civil Rights Trip to Atlanta, very similar to the one that just took place with a group of Temple Sholom adults.

In recent years, our family programs have been extremely successful. In a less formalized way, we look towards involving our parents more in our project-based learning. Their increased involvement in all aspects of our programming can serve to build more positive communication within our Temple community, as well as enhance the personal bonds between generations.

Our TOASTY youth group, directed by Mariassa Kimmel, is primarily social in design, whereas our *Rimon* program is primarily educational. We look towards creating a deliberate overlap between the two programs. From kindergarten on up, we look towards holding regular social group events, some with students and some with entire families.

B'Yachad, secured through a special grant and in its final year, has been a highly successful intergenerational program. We look to create more intergenerational programs.

We all look forward to boasting that our Temple Sholom teenagers play a vital role in every aspect of our Temple community and programming. We hope you have enjoyed this brief glimpse into the future!

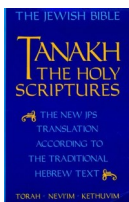
BRINGING OUR COMMUNITY TOGETHER

HOW TO HELP OTHERS FEEL INCLUDED

Ways to make our synagogue a more welcoming place to people with disabilities:

- If you see a child having a difficult behavior moment, offer the parent a friendly smile, a sympathetic nod, or an offer to help
- Offer to help someone who may be having trouble accessing the entrance to Temple Sholom. Be proactive in holding doors, making room for others in the seating, offering an arm, or carrying something
- Not all disabilities are "visible." If you see a person exhibiting atypical behavior, understand that it might be a sign of disability. Embrace the person as being created *Btzelem Elohim* - in the Divine Image
- If you see someone who is disheveled or out of sorts, consider that he or she may be experiencing issues related to mental illness, substance abuse, or a behavior disorder. Act with *chesed*, loving-kindness
- Some people with attention and sensory issues may find it hard to sit through services. Young children may also need to move around. Practice acceptance and understanding of their need to move or get up and down during services
- Remember that a warm smile, nod, or small kindness can make all the difference for any of us

Remember, "For my house shall be a house of prayer for all people." (Isaiah 56:5)

Temple Sholom strives to be fully inclusive and anticipate congregant needs, but needs you to let us know how we can be even more inclusive and sensitive to the needs of its congregants. RIGHT at the bridge at the intersection of Bishop Hollow Rd and Chapel Hill Rd.

Entrance to the park is at the end of the bridge on your right.

Note: Bishop Hollow Rd ends at Chapel Hill Rd. and the name changes to N. Ridley Creek Rd.

An alternate route from the Temple:

Go up Media Line Rd to Gradyville and take Gradyville to Bishop Hollow Rd.

Turn left on Bishop Hollow Rd. till you get to the bridge where you turn right for the parking lot and entrance to the park.

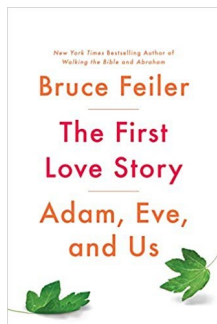

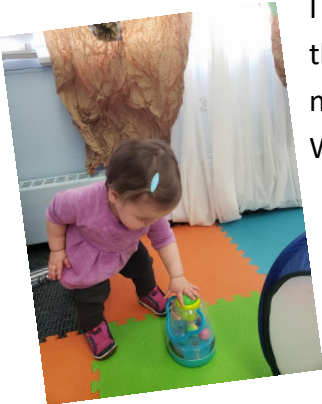
TEMPLE SHOLOM PRESCHOOL: I WONDER

back and forth. The little girl kept laughing and
throwing and the teacher kept going.

I once read a book titled *The Scientist in the Crib* (by Alison Gopnik) that spoke about infants as learners and teachers. This book stuck with me for years and changed the way I look at babies. They are smart and capable and everything they do, from throwing a ball, (or your keys, or their lunch) to sticking out their tongue, is intentional. They are well designed activities in the infants' brains to help them learn. What babies are learning for instance is that if they throw the ball it will land. And someone will give it back to them. And they will throw it again. And it will come back again. This simple idea is expressed in science terms by Sir Isaac Newton's Laws of Motion.

Another little girl was pushing the button on top of a spinner. She would hit it faster and harder, watching the balls inside jump and pop as she kept going. The teacher would say "you are pushing the button, the balls are jumping", giving language to the activity that is happening. One boy is playing with a large clear tube, filled with bells. He is shaking it up and down, watching the bells move, listening to the sound with a smile on his face. And a fourth child is pulling books out of the book center, opening the pages, looking at pictures, closing the book and starting over again. He loves to see the pictures and "talks about" what he sees, making animal sounds and smiling.

In our Blue Room – Infant Class, the babies are always learning and creating with Miss Albana and Miss Lisa. A recent visit to the class, saw one little girl throwing colored balls out of a ball pit, waiting each time for her teacher to throw the ball back. The teacher would call out the colors and say green ball out, green ball in as the ball went

Our little scientists wonder and think and learn every day.

Sinai Moments!

Shavuot, the Jewish festival marking the giving of the Torah at Mount Sinai, will be upon us on June 9th. Upon reflecting on the meaning of the holiday my mind conjured up a tableau of all the Israelites who stood at the foot of the mountain awaiting the awe-inspiring gift of the Torah. It was a moment of collective experience and joy. Each person, young and old alike, shared in this inspirational and transformative moment, and thus, setting a course for generations to come.

The idea of the “collective” reminds me much of what the *Rimon* experience has been this year. Our learners, their families, and congregants-at-large came together to learn together, to work together, and to create “Sinai” moments that will continue in our collective memory. Here are just a few of these moments:

Rimon Noar (7th – 12th grades)



- Coming together with our Hilltoppers to create ceramic butterflies to memorialize the 1.5 million children who perished in the Holocaust
- Understanding and coming to know our multi-religious community through Rabbi Rigler’s “Visiting Clergy” program
- Discovering the diverse narratives of those living in Israel today
- *B’Yachad* teens and senior adults culminating their two-year journey of learning, laughing, and engaging in social action together

Gesherim (6th gr.)

- 6th gr. families engaging in a year-long journey of discover toward B’nai Mitzvah

Rimon (Kindergarten – 5th grades)

- *Olim* (4th/5th grades) diving deep to discover their passions for tzedakah and gemilut chasidim and creating their own (very successful) Tzedakah Fair. Learning that being a Reform Jew means making informed choice as they embarked on a learning unit on Kashrut.
- *Chaverim* (2nd/3rd grades) learning about being created B’tzelem Elohim – In the image of God and acting on that understanding through service to others.
- *Bonim* (Kind./1st gr.) understanding what it means to be created B’tzelem Elohim and demonstrating their learning through creating their own page of Talmud.

Our children were not the only ones who experience Sinai Moments. The memories that were created from our wildly successful **Purim Carnival** under the chairpersonship of Marie Gould leaves a legacy for future carnivals. The warm feelings that surrounded every step of our *Rimon* fundraiser, **Masks and Margaritas** chaired by Susan Friedman and Evan Gold, exemplify what it means to be a community.

On to *Rimon* 2019-2020 and the making of new Sinai Moments.

RESPECTING EVERY CHILD'S LEARNING NEEDS

Being a TAP teen has inspired me to more effectively respond to the challenges of teaching. This year is my second year working with a joint class of kindergarten and first graders at Temple Sholom in Broomall. I love working with these kids, as they always have lots of fun and energy in store! While a teacher must control the classroom as a whole, my focus as a madrich are the needs of each individual child. Thanks to the TAP Program, I have learned various techniques for working with children with learning differences. In a younger class, movement, creativity, and patience are key. Kindergartners often begin Sunday school timid and closed-off, however, children who leaned on me as a friend began feeling more comfortable in class.

In my classroom, we often emphasize the Hebrew word *kavod*, meaning respect. Children become more responsive when they trust and respect you. I have found successes in working with these children often come from the special bonds we have formed over time. Sometimes, a child who

acts out the most is simply the one who needs a little positive encouragement and support!

It is important to remember that every child learns differently. Setbacks including time coming up with more creative approaches and a child's "off days" may contribute to a moment of understanding. TAP has taught me that we must show students kindness and respect so that each child has the opportunity to learn to the best of their ability.

Since starting TAP I have seen an improvement in my teaching skills, and hope to continue learning about how to help kids with learning difficulties in new ways. Creating an engaging Jewish learning experience is an incredibly meaningful opportunity, and I am proud to be a TAP teen.

“OLD COMRADES” BAND ASTOUNDS HILLTOPPERS WITH MUSIC FROM 32 MUSICIANS

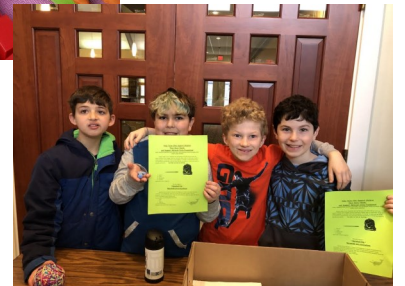

Each day, the squares can be switched so that the baby has the parent's scent and the parent can have the baby's scent. The square comforts the baby, and also helps stimulate the mother to lactate. This mitzvah project meant a lot to her because Olivia was born prematurely and spent several weeks in the NICU.

A Springton Lake Middle School 7th grader, Lily is interested in horseback riding, gymnastics, basketball, and nature.

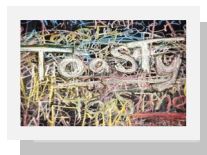

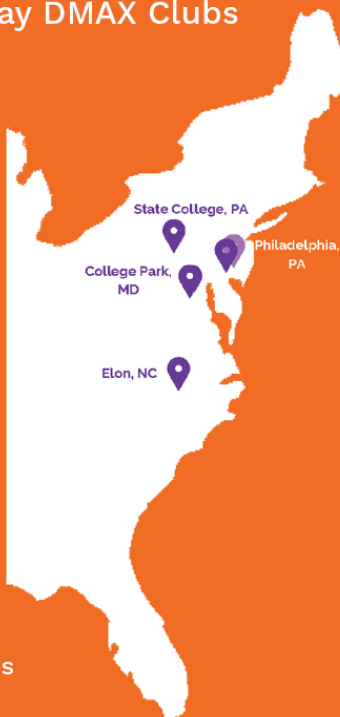

Ronnie Reutlinger Breslow, formerly known as Renate Reutlinger, was born in Kirchheim, Germany. In 1939, her father left for Cuba as men were most in danger at the time (they only had a single ticket). Ronnie and her mother boarded the next ship called the St. Louis on May 13, 1939 and sailed with 936 other Jews for Cuba. For safekeeping, Ronnie brought her stamp collection. Cuba refused to allow the St. Louis to dock which forced the ship to stay adrift at sea for weeks. Eventually, they wound up in Holland and put in a detention camp called Rotterdam West. To gain passage for both of them to the United States, her mother gave the Camp commander, an avid stamp collector, Ronnie's stamp collection. All others who stayed were transported to a transit camp and died. The stamp collection saved their lives.

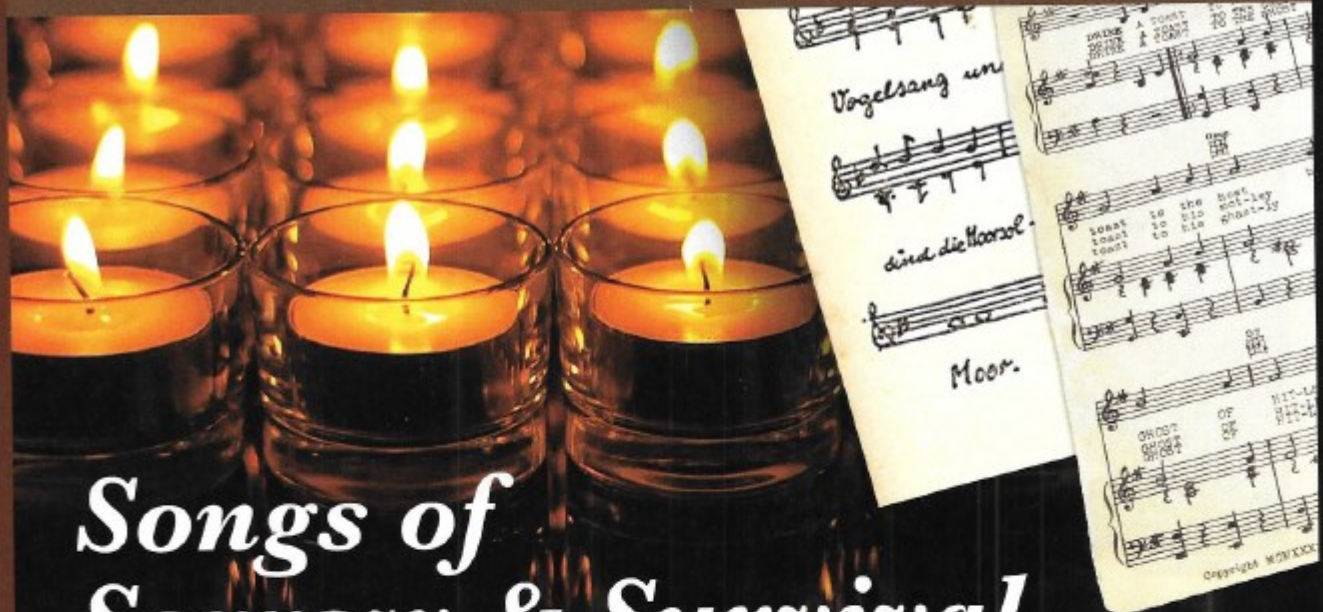

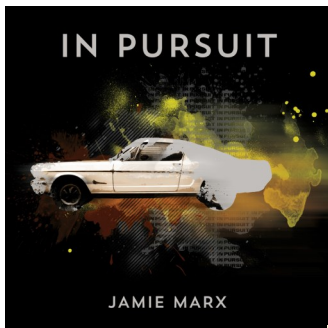


