FROM THE DESK OF RABBI RIGLER



During these summer months we will have almost 50 participants at our URJ camps: from Camp Harlam in the Poconos to those participating at our Science camp, Arts Camp or Sports Camp. We have a few teens headed to Israel and another who will be volunteering with Mitzvah Corps in Seattle working with refugees. We of course will continue our Friday

night Shabbat services; a great chance to join with friends and relax! Our building will of course be open and busy, especially with our Preschool summer camp with children playing and lots of activity.

I will have the opportunity to travel to Poland with 60 teens to share the Holocaust history and lead a worship service with 500. I will then head to Barcelona to meet with leaders of the Jewish community, share Shabbat and explore the rich Jewish traditions of the city with the Reform Rabbi. We have already planned a full two days of touring together and learning! Following I get to spend several days at Camp Harlam as faculty. It is a good summer plan but, it is the way that I rekindle my flame and prepare for the busy year ahead! The summer is filled with opportunity for us and for our children!

When I went to our URJ summer Camp as a kid, I remember hearing a poem from Shel Silverstein that I think of as we begin the summer.

HERE COMES by Shel Silverstein

Here comes summer. Here comes summer. Chirping robin, budding rose. Here comes summer. Here comes summer. Gentle showers, summer clothes. *Here comes summer.* Here comes summer-Whoosh—shiver—there it goes.

PARA PROGRAM

Our community is blessed to have Para clergy who do a beautiful job leading worship when the Cantor and I are with our families, at our URJ camps or at conferences. This coming summer is no exception. We are excited to have Rabbi David Levin and Arlana Gottlieb participating this year. We wanted to share with the community the summer schedule and who will be leading.

How will we find that time to slow down the passing time this summer? There is a beautiful Midrash about the giving of the Ten Commandments, one of my favorites. It imagines the precise moment before God spoke the words of Torah at Sinai as a moment of profound silence and stillness. A moment when the world became soundless. When even the endless waves of the sea stopped their incessant murmuring. When the entire world paused to listen. Sometimes there are no words. That is a hard thing for a rabbi to admit. In some ways, we are paid talkers.

What is the old joke? "Before I speak, I would just like to say a few words." That is a joke made for rabbis. But sometimes, silence is better. Sometimes stillness allows us to think and feel, to understand more deeply, to sense more profoundly, to experience more fully. In our increasingly busy and noisy world, those moments are few and far between. But we should look for them, search them out. Often they are right there, waiting to be discovered, waiting for us to be still, waiting for us to listen. May the summer ahead bring time to listen and to be still. We are so excited to be back in full swing in the fall but feel blessed to breathe the air of the summer!

Notes from Cantor Jamie Marx



Summer break has always felt to me like entering another world. Whether I was a kid hanging around my house all summer (that was still allowed back in the '80s), headed off to a day camp, or working at a summer job, that transition between the school year and summer held power and mystery in it.

The anticipation built up as we passed through the final weeks of school, until we burst through to the other side in an almost disorienting emotional and psychological transition.

Even today, though my job continues year-round and the freedom of summer isn't quite what it was when I was a kid, the awareness that change is coming feels weighty and powerful. Our tradition teaches that these transitions are opportunities for reflection, appreciation, and awareness. Rabbi Arthur Waskow talks about this idea using the word sh'ma" ("listen"). He breaks it up that one word into three pieces: "shh," "mmm," and "ahh!" First we find quietude ("shh"), pausing from our daily grind to acknowledge that something is changing. Then we express our gratitude for what we have, what we see, for the gifts that the transition

provides us ("mmm"). And then we take a piece of that gratitude and consider what it would mean to take it with us into this new phase of the year, bringing a childlike wonder and sense of awe for the mystery that is life ("ahh!").

No matter what your summer may look like, what plans you may have, rituals you may engage in, or trips you have scheduled, take some time to mark the passing time and give thanks for all the gifts and blessings that have come your way.

Temple Sholom Annual Congregational Meeting June 19, 2019

Once a year, our Constitution says that we have to meet as a congregation and do the Temple's business. And, so we do. On June 19, about 40 of our members met to do just that. Next, our auxiliaries reviewed the last year. Brotherhood President Dave Mer could not be at the meeting but Laurie

President Laurie Browngoehl called the meeting to order and asked Rabbi Rigler to start the meeting with a D'var Torah. He said that this week's parshah talks about being lamplighters, spreading light through the neighborhood. He asked how we can continue to be lamplighters? Many people pass through our doors over the year. We spread our light to all these visitors. We continue to do sacred work for our community, and we will continue this into the future.

Laurie's opening remarks noted that a year has passed in her term. Now we are entering a year of celebrating Rabbi's 10th year with us. We have 430 family units, about the same number that we have had during Rabbi's tenure. Other religious organizations are experiencing membership declines while we are holding steady. Each of these congregants has different interests, and this leads to our strength. The Tree of Life Synagogue attack in Pittsburgh has increased our sense of community and we received support from other religious organizations in the area and by local government. We increased security at our facility and asked for donations to meet the cost. A teacher in the Preschool found mold in the Annex, and we took action: we moved the children out and contracted with professionals for remediation. Thanks to a donor, the ceiling lights in the multipurpose room have been rehabbed. Now, we are looking forward to our Gala in October, and to additional social action activities during the year.

Recording Secretary Jim Meyer asked for approval of the minutes of the 2018 annual meeting. Bev Granoff made a motion for approval and Lawrence Husick seconded

the motion. The minutes were approved unanimously.

He then introduced the candidates for Treasurer, Financial Security, VP-at-Large, and the seven candidates for Trustee. Then, the attendees voted.

While the votes were counted, a seven minute year-in-review slide show, created by our Community Coordinator Marissa Kimmel with background music by Cantor Jamie Marx, was shown.

Next, our auxiliaries reviewed the last year. Brotherhood President Dave Mendell could not be at the meeting but Laurie noted that the Brotherhood had activities over the year and are planning more for the year ahead. Hilltoppers President Cindy Meyer noted that Hilltoppers started 25 years ago. She reviewed the monthly meetings and book club and mentioned the plans for the upcoming year. She also presented a check for \$750 for the Temple's General Fund.

Sisterhood is running without a president so Barbara Barr, Sisterhood's representative on the Temple Board, Fran Epstein and Donna Hendel, Sisterhood's former co-presidents, reviewed all the group's activities. And these are just some: Shana Tova cards, Sisterhood Shabbat, a trip to the Media Theatre to see Saturday Night Fever and then to dinner, WRJ Heritage Day at the National Museum of American Jewish History, a book club that reviewed 5 books, Bimah baskets that raised money to support the Life Center of Eastern Delaware County, raised about \$600 for the Jewish National Fund, sent gifts to college students, ran the Gift Garden, did holiday gift wrapping, gave holiday gifts to our employees, and Sisterhood gave \$2,500 to the Temple's General Fund. Barbara, Fran, and Donna serve as the hub around which the other members of Sisterhood revolve.

Outgoing Treasurer Steve Granoff thanked his Finance Committee for the work they did creating the Budget that he was presenting. He also thanked our bookkeeper, Betsy Blackburn-Goslin for her help over the years. The proposed 2019-2020 Budget includes a \$50 per family security charge and a 2% cost-ofliving increase. It also includes \$11,000 to repair the Annex because of the mold. He noted that we spend \$56,000 per year for interest on our mortgages. The in-house mortgage will be paid off at the end of 2019, but we will still obligated to pay \$45,000 per year to Bryn Mawr Trust. The Gala is aiming to eliminate this annual expense. He also thanked Marc Albero for his help working on the Budget. Steve made a motion to approve the proposed Budget. Marc seconded that motion and it was approved unanimously.

Next, volunteer appreciation awards were handed out. Our librarian, Mary Ann Gould, presented the David Lefcourt Library Service award to Honore Poch and Susan Farber for their work preparing and maintaining the books. Laurie presented Marie Gould with the Makor Hayim (Source of Our Strength) award for her work on behalf of the Preschool. The Treasure of Sholom award was presented to Nancy Bloomfield for her many years of service as, among others, President and Financial Secretary. She said that "it has been an honor to serve" and "I will still be active." She was presented with a print by recent artist-in-residence, Mordechai Rosenstein. Steve Granoff was presented the Volunteer Appreciation award for his eight years serving as Temple Treasurer, and leading our targeted fundraising: two Galas and heading our third. He was presented with a Shehecheyanu serigraph by our 1996 scholar-in-residence Sam Maitin.

Jim Meyer came back with the election results (all terms are for 2 years, 2019-2021):

Marc Albero was elected Treasurer Emily Mendell was elected Financial Secretary Michael Galvin and Steve Granoff were elected VP-at-Large

Evalyn Elias, Evan Gold, Donna Hendel, Henry Jaffe, Ira Kedson, and Lisa Pottiger were elected Trustees

Blake Robinson was elected Alternate Trustee

To close the meeting, Cantor Marx taught a song: Hazak hazak venit-hazek (from strength to strength).

And an hour after the Constitutionmandated meeting started, all business having been addressed, the meeting adjourned.

TREASURER'S YEAR-END WRAP-UP

In this, my last report to you as treasurer, I need to thank my Finance Committee members for making the past eight years a memorable experience. We've argued, laughed and deliberated for many months as a unit, always with the deepest respect for one another and with a common love for the Temple and a deep commitment to its fiscal well-being.

Among the committees that I have chaired in my synagogue life you rank at the very highest level. It has been a pleasure working with you and I appreciate all of your efforts more than I can say. You have made the budgetary reporting that this office requires very easy to fulfill.

This year's members are: Marc Albero, Rachel Amdur, Nancy Bloomfield, Robin Gall, Evan Gold, Mary Anne Gould, Steve Hendel, Margaret Husick, Eric Lieberman, Emily Mendell, Jim Meyer; our exofficios, Abbey Krain & Laurie Browngoehl and of blessed memory, Mitch Wolfson. My deepest and dearest thanks to you all.

Thanks also to the staff at Temple Sholom, particularly Betsy Blackburn-Goslin, for your help and cooperation in making this position a relatively easy job to fulfil for the past eight years.

In presenting this year's budget for your approval, I would be remiss if I didn't point out several key factors that drive it.

REVENUES:

After the rash of murders in houses of worship in this country and throughout the world, the Finance committee felt a need to continue the enhanced security put into place at the Temple this past fiscal year. Rather than, as in the past, seeking private donations to fund this program, a fee of \$50 per congregational household has been budgeted. This fee, when implemented, will cover the expense of a security guard for the coming year and may provide some extra funds to put in some other security enhancements.

Preschool increased enrollments and increased costs awareness have helped make this year's projections the most optimistic in many years

Dues increase matches area cost of living increase projections of 2%. A view to competition and a sensitivity to affordability area always used as guidelines

EXPENSES:

- Mold remediation in the Annex is expected to cost between \$15,000 and \$20,000. The repairs expense reflects that projection
- The aforementioned enhanced security expenses are expected to cost \$21,000
- Administrative costs have been adjusted to reflect a new austerity program
- Non-contractual payroll has been increased by 2%, reflecting a cost of living adjustment, except for the Preschool administrator. In her case, her increase is greater in order to bring her compensation into competitive status

Our Temple currently has two mortgages which cost us approximately \$56,000 annually. One is an in-house mortgage which will be retired in December (\$11,000) and a primary mortgage with Bryn Mawr Trust. The mortgage with Bryn Mawr Trust continues to cost operations approximately \$45,000 in negative cash flow yearly and yearly there are a good many maintenance projects or innovative programs that go unfulfilled simply because we have run out of money to fund them.

Retiring this primary mortgage will go a long way to resolving those issues.

As you already know, we have launched a major fundraiser culminating in a Gala celebration the weekend of October 25-27. This Gala weekend will celebrate Rabbi Rigler's 10th Anniversary as our spiritual leader and all proceeds from fundraising opportunities will go directly to burning the Bryn Mawr Trust mortgage (\$250,000) in his honor and to help fund those projects and ensure Temple Sholom's financial stability and future. More information on these fundraising opportunities are forthcoming.

Before I make the motion to approve this coming fiscal year's budget, I want to acknowledge my successor as treasurer, Marc Albero.

Marc, this office is one of the most rewarding experiences you will ever have and I know that I'm passing the torch to someone who is more than qualified to continue the stewardship that it implies. I wish you great success and know that I am always willing and available to assist you if any issues arise that you need me for. All you need do is reach out and I'll be there.

Finally, I want to thank you, my fellow Temple Sholom congregants, You have honored me by allowing me to serve as your Treasurer for the past eight years. I am.forever grateful for your trust and confidence in me and I only hope that I have lived up to it.

Below you will see our budget graphs: a snapshot of this year's Temple budget.


If you have financial challenges, please let me know. We have financial scholarships available, and will work with you to make your membership commitment one that is feasible.

Please remember to let me know if you have any prospective members in mind. Together, we will get the word out that we are seeking new members.





STEP UP, STEP OUT & CELEBRATE FAQ

Q. What is Step Up, Step Out and Celebrate?

A. Step Up, Step Out and Celebrate is a weekend-long series of events both to recognize the tenth anniversary of the investiture of Rabbi Peter Rigler as our spiritual leader and to raise muchneeded funds that will allow us to retire our principal mortgage and so ensure the fiscal future of Temple Sholom. Events begin on Friday evening, October 25th with Shabbat dinner, services and an elaborate Oneg, and they continue on Sunday, October 27th with a cocktail party and performance by the Capitol Steps.

Q. What is this mortgage and how much do we need to raise for its retirement?

A. Our mortgage is with a commercial area bank and, at the time of Step Up, Step Out and Celebrate, its balance will be approximately \$250,000 with seven years until retirement. By raising the \$250,000 in this campaign, we will save approximately \$45,000 in principal and interest payments per year.

Q. Will eliminating the mortgage payments allow congregants to reduce their annual Temple commitment fees?

A. No. Savings generated by not having this mortgage burden will be used to fund projects we have already identified as well as invest in new and innovative services for the continued growth and stability of our Temple community. While our congregation is getting younger each year, our building continues to age. With its aging, many smaller and routine projects require either the use of operating funds or private donations or just wind up getting put off.

Q. Will there be Step Up, Step Out and Celebrate events available for those who can't afford the various commitment levels?

A. Yes. The committee is always sensitive to the Temple community at large and has planned several opportunities that are available at little or no cost. For information about these opportunities, see the details elsewhere in this issue of the Tidings or contact the Temple office

Q. Besides the performance by the Capitol Steps, what else is planned and what are the costs?

Tzedakah (Food) Fund


To feed the hungry in our community. Contributions are distributed at the close of each fiscal year to outside charities at the discretion of a special Tzedakah committee.


