FROM THE DESK OF RABBI RIGLER



Friends,

For many of us this time of year can be overwhelming and very busy. Take the time this year to enrich your life with the cycle of our own Jewish time. For our community, the days leading up to and including S'lichot, Rosh

Hashanah, and Yom Kippur, then extending through Sukkot and Simchat Torah, are filled with family and community, deep memories and emotions, rich imagery, and the eternal spiritual opportunities of renewal, forgiveness, reconciliation, gratitude, joy, and the Divine that animates all life.

This season is a time of deep introspection and reflection. *Teshuvah* - Return - marks this deeply soulful time. Return to ourselves, to our loved ones, to our community, to our traditions, to our God, and ultimately and hopefully: Return to our most cherished values and to the best that is within us. We have the precious opportunity during this sacred time to dust off the compass of our lives, get our bearings, and return to the direction we most deeply need to be heading in our lives. The "soul's compass" - to borrow a beautiful expression from spiritual teacher Dr. Joan Borysenko - takes precedence during the High Holy Day season, pointing us toward renewed life with our families, friends, community, and God.

To help make your Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur more enriching and meaningful, I want to offer you a spiritual practice of our tradition. It is the practice of what is called, *Cheshbon haNefesh* - literally, an "accounting of the soul." This centuries-old practice consists of spending a few minutes each day in self-

Listening to the Sacred Call

According to Facebook, I'm really into cooking videos and woodworking demonstrations. You'd be hard-pressed to guess that based on actually knowing me, but the algorithm has determined that's what I

want to see. Though I enjoy cooking, rarely do those videos feature recipes that I could ever manage or have any interest in making myself. But that's not really the point of those videos. They're just cotton candy, fluff that's enjoyable, but ultimately having no impact.

And let's face it; this is what Facebook is best at. Instant gratification. Getting a thrill, a laugh, a pang of sympathy, or a dose of indignation with no further connection, attachment, or effort required. Social media has been around long enough now that we know exactly how it works. We know that they make money off of user engagement — eyeballs looking at ads — and that even more than happy things, it's indignation, outrage, and anger that really gets us to engage.

That's led us into a vicious spiral where the only news we hear about any controversial issue is slanted to opinions we already hold and written in a way to get us worked up. And when people on the other side of the political spectrum share something on Facebook, we already know we disagree. We don't have to read the article, we don't have to think about the Op-Ed's angle, or watch the video attached to the email — by dint of being associated with certain organizations or political parties, we know who stands on the side of right and wrong.

And here we stand as a people on the threshold of the High Holy Days, reflecting on where our own balance of right and wrong has fallen in the past year. It would be easy to blame a lot on social media, but the deeper issue is our desire for instant gratification. It's so much easier to receive and experience and take without listening or engaging, without doing the hard work of meeting those with whom we disagree and seeing the world through their eyes. We shout our replies into the ether, bemoaning and badgering and hectoring each other. We are in the midst of an epidemic of not-listening.


On Rosh Hashanah, the blessing for the sounding of the shofar makes clear the mitzvah is to hear the shofar, not to sound it. Only a bare handful of Jews have the honor of sounding the shofar during the High Holy Days, but all of us can hear the sacred call and make a choice to respond. We know the issues we face are complicated, but we reduce our neighbors, co-workers, and family to simplistic motivations or malevolence borne of ignorance. The call of the shofar is our reminder to listen.

First, we must listen to the sacred call to action within us. It's much easier to share an article on Facebook or post in the comments section, but the shofar demands action from us. Donate, volunteer, or get on your feet and protest. But if your advocacy is only on Facebook, it's not advocacy.

Second, we must acknowledge the sacred call that others hear. We don't have to always agree on the issues, but we must recognize the face of the Divine that lies in each of us and say, yes, we disagree, but we're all humans. We each have principles that we believe in and other people will put theirs in different orders of priority than we might choose for ourselves. Stand up for what you believe in, but don't give in to the temptation to dehumanize those you disagree with.

Our sacred texts teach that God's voice can shatter mountains and it can be a soft murmuring sound. As we move ever closer towards the Days of Awe, let us pray not that God hears our prayers, but that when God responds, we are able to listen. L'shana Tova.



Inclusion and Special Needs Accommodations

For you theater lovers, the Broadway community now has wonderful accessibility products that they will loan you for free if you attend a show in NYC. Thanks to Sound Associates, more and better devices are available. For years, theaters have offered Infrared Assisted Hearing devices for people who can hear through headphones. But for many people with hearing impairments, this device is not an option. Sound Associates now provides I Caption boxes at most NYC shows. It is a hand held device with electronic text (closed captioning). Also available are Visually Descriptive units that describe the show to people with visual impairments. To check out if a show you are interested in has these devices, go to: www.soundassociates.com/services/blistings. There is a listing of the current shows (mostly musical ones, but there are straight plays as well) and which devices are offered.

Another amazing technology that is now available is an app for your smart phone that you can download from Apple or Android stores, called GalaPro. You can click on for closed captioning text for the show you are seeing in real time. This works for shows in NYC, London, Niagara on the Lake, and other cities. Once a show has been performing for 3 weeks, you can use this app at the theater for your own individual captioning convenience. All for free. It's wonderful when technology connects people and enables them to participate and engage with others at events. This is Inclusion at its best.

We continue to provide information about programs in the community that are thoughtfully attentive to the needs of people with special needs with the goal of providing inclusion so that everyone can benefit from the participation of each person. The Inclusion Committee remains committed to assist any Temple Sholom member, family member, or guest with a disability who is seeking an accommodation that will enable him/her/them to fully participate in any Temple program, service, or activity.
