




## Enrollment Requirements

In accordance with the policy and position articulated by the Union of Reform Judaism (URJ) regarding enrollment in Reform religious schools, we embrace and maintain the following position:

A student registered in Temple Sholom Religious School should not be enrolled in the religious education and/or religious training programs of other religions or faith communities.

Admission to Rimon at Temple Sholom is open to <u>all</u> children whose parents/guardians are members of Temple Sholom. Our mission is to help our children build a foundation and teach Judaism as a faith that is lived, enabling our students to see themselves as participatory members of the Jewish community and embracing a relationship with God, Torah and Israel.

## B'nei Mitzvah Requirements

## Students must be enrolled in the Rimon program through the year of the B'nei Mitzvah

Becoming B'nei Mitzvah is an exciting lifecycle moment for emerging teens. This is the beginning of adulthood! We want every student to feel comfortable with their skills as well as comfortable in our sanctuary and on our bimah. In order to achieve this students must reach Hebrew mastery to the best of their ability through our Rimon program. Every child, regardless of ability, is invited to become a B'nei Mitzvah at Temple Sholom. (Please speak with Cantor Marx or Lori Green with any questions or concerns.)



### Mission and Goals

#### **Mission Statement**

Rimon is committed to learning that embraces, inspires, and matters to all of our learners:

- We embrace each learner where they are and as they are, welcoming them to feel part of something bigger.
- We *inspire* each learner to learn about Judaism and themselves, using tools rooted in our tradition to become their best selves.
- We matter by inviting our learners to build a community of friends who respect each other and work together to improve our world.

#### **Rationale (Why?)**

Our Reform Jewish tradition is founded on informed choice with the goal of becoming our best selves - helping each of us to make our world a better place. In order to reach this goal our Kindergarten through 12th grade learners explore, investigate and reflect on our past, find personal meaning in those lessons for today, and look toward the future. We put much emphasis on Torah and contemporary history through the lessons they teach. Through the holiday cycle we observe and celebrate throughout the year, we find מצוֹת (commandments) have been passed down from generation to generation since receiving of the Torah at Mt. Sinai. The study and action of these mitzvot מצוֹת help us to make the world a better place through social justice and social action. Education at Rimon is considered to be a life-long process that emphasizes the partnership between parents, synagogue and school.

#### <u>Goals</u>

The goals of Rimon include pluralism, community-building, and voice and choice.

#### Pluralism:

Rimon aims to be a place whose learners may come from diverse ethnic, racial, religious-identity, political tendencies and/or social groups. Learners and their families maintain participation in and development of their traditions and special interests while cooperatively working toward the interdependence between their home, Temple Sholom, and their communities. The outcomes include elements of interdependence, development, and cooperation among our learners and their families. We offer the space for our learners and their families to make Reform Judaism choices based on knowledge and guidance.

#### Community-Building

Our Rimon learners come from as far south as the Penn-Delco School District and as far north as the North Penn School District. Many of our learners have limited connections to other Jewish friends their age. <u>This</u> is why community-building is such a focal point of Rimon. Building connections between our learners is as important as the lessons and skills that they gain. This is the reason why we group our learners by two grades!

#### Voice and Choice

Research informs us that learners are more engaged and, therefore, more successful at internalizing material when they are involved in the learning process. This includes experiencing voice and choice in both the focus of the learning, including the activities with which they engage and projects they may design. Student-centered engagement and PBL offer students these opportunities.



At Temple Sholom, we strive to provide our learners and their families with tools to understand the Jewish past, connect to the Jewish present, and become an integral part of the Jewish future. We acknowledge – and celebrate – that our learners and their families connect to Judaism in different ways. It is our goal to invite all ages into the conversation as they explore, investigate, question, and experience the richness of Reform Judaism. We seek to create experiences that will enable all learners and families to be challenged, exhilarated, and energized by the power of Jewish ideas, community, and tradition.

## We Are Here for ALL of our Learners

Rimon is an inclusive and sacred learning community that welcomes and celebrates the uniqueness of each individual and family.

To that end, we are committed to creating an inclusive environment for all families, respecting and welcoming equally all races, sexual orientation, gender identities, family structures, and religious backgrounds.



Our Jewish tradition teaches that one should "teach a child according to their own path." The welcoming learning environment at Rimon strives to make Jewish education accessible to all children. Our faculty and madrichim (teen aides) work hard to ensure that every child has the opportunity to engage alongside their peers.

Although Rimon does not have a dedicated special needs program, we do make every effort to accommodate the needs of every child. We welcome you to begin a conversation with us. The Hebrew word *Bonim* means "builders". Our Bonim learners will do just that – *build* friendships and a foundation of Jewish knowledge that will continue to *build* for a lifetime. Your child will join with other Kindergarten and 1st graders to take a deep dive into topics that excite and engage. Each year we have an overarching "theme of the year". This year's theme is –"Learning with Joy". Through student-centered learning including music, stories, art, interactive play and more, your child will engage in lively learning activities that will stimulate their curiosity. Community, traditions and rituals, sacred places, holidays, Hebrew "experiences", social action and *mitzvot* will be just some of the topics that they will explore. How can we connect all of this to everyday lives? We will encourage our learners to ask questions and make connections between Jewish tradition and today's world.

As a family, you will have opportunities to join your child for special programs such as holiday celebrations, social action programs, family learning and more!

What will a typical Sunday morning of Rimon look like for my child? Each Sunday morning learners are greeted by name and join together for Kehillah Boker (Morning Community). It is a time for each child to share something about the past week, ask a question, or just say "shalom" to their friends. After this, the joyful work of learning begins! To end the morning all of our Sunday learners (and their families) come together in our sanctuary for Kehillah Sof (End of Community Time).

On a rotating schedule of weeks, your child and their friends will:

- Engage with Hebrew Through Movement (please see the Hebrew page)
- Visit our Temple Sholom library
- Participate and engage with age-appropriate tefillah (prayer experiences) in our sanctuary, led by our song leaders with visits by Rabbi Rigler and Cantor Marx
- Participate in chugim (clubs) of their choice
- Enjoy a snack of challah and juice along with reciting blessings



#### **Chaverim** (Friends) 2nd Grade and 3rd Grade Sunday Mornings 9:30 am - Noon

Chaverim means "friends" in Hebrew. Chaverim works together to build friendships as they work in large and small groups to dive into explorations that excite and engage.

Each year Rimon learning is guided by an overarching "theme". This year's theme is –"Learning with Joy". Through music, stories, art, creating, innovating, asking LOTS of questions and reflecting on the topic your child will engage in lively discussions that encourage them to make connections between Jewish tradition and today's world.

As a family, you will have opportunities to join your child for special programs such as holiday celebrations, social action programs, family learning and more!

What will a typical Sunday morning of engagement look like for my child?

Each Sunday morning learners are greeted by name and join together for Kehillah Boker (Morning Community). It is a time for each child to share something about the past week, ask a question, or just say "shalom" to their friends. After this, the fun of exploration begins! To end the morning our Sunday learners (and their families) come together in our sanctuary for Kehillah Sof (End of Community Time).

On a rotating schedule of weeks, your child and their friends will:

- Engage with Hebrew Through Movement a joyous and movement-filled experience that introduces your child to the sounds of Hebrew
- Visit our Temple Sholom library
- Participate and engage with age-appropriate tefillah (prayer experiences) in our sanctuary, led by our song leaders with visits by Rabbi Rigler and Cantor Marx
- Participate in chugim (clubs) of their choice
- Enjoy a snack of challah and juice along with blessings



Olim ("those moving up") is the perfect description for this age group. Your child is moving up physically and intellectually while also beginning to question the world around them. Olim builds on this growth by encouraging your child to ask lots of questions and make the learning their own. Student-centered learning and Project Based Learning design will invite your child to work with their peers to ask big questions, participate in inquiry, plan, create, reflect, revise and, ultimately, present their ideas to an authentic audience. Broadly, your child will learn about the yearly holiday cycle, Torah, God ideas, Israel, and Hebrew.

As a family, you will have opportunities to join your child for special programs such as holiday celebrations, 4th Naming Ceremony, social action programs, family learning and more!

Each year Rimon learning is guided by an overarching "theme". The "theme" that will guide this year is "Learning with Joy". Community, traditions and rituals, sacred places, holidays, social justice, social action and *mitzvot* are among the topics that they will explore.

Each Sunday morning learners are greeted by name and join together for Kehillah Boker (Morning Community). It is a time for each child to share something about the past week, ask a question, or just say "shalom" to their friends. After this, the collaboration and investigation begins. To end the morning all of our Sunday learners (and their families) come together in our sanctuary for Kehillah Sof (End of Community Time)

On a rotating schedule of weeks, your child and their friends will:

- Participate and engage with age-appropriate tefillah (prayer experiences) in our sanctuary, led by our song leaders with visits by Rabbi Rigler and Cantor Marx
- Participate in chugim (clubs) of their choice
- Enjoy a snack of challah and juice along with blessings

#### Gesherim (Bridges)

6<sup>th</sup> Grade and their Families Meets 9:30am – Noon (Two times per month – once as students <u>only</u> and once student and their parent(s))



The word Gesherim means bridges. As a 6<sup>th</sup> grader, your child is bridging the span between childhood and pre-teen. This is a special time for you and your child.

Although 6<sup>th</sup> graders continue to attend mid-week Rimon Hebrew, they will no longer attend the "traditional" Sunday Rimon program. What they will do is, along with their families, enter an experience that will lead them to start their own future Jewish journey into adulthood.

Gesherim is a unique program designed to guide you <u>and</u> your child, both separately and together, on a path to B'nei Mitzvah and beyond. Led by a dynamic and experienced educator, your child will meet monthly with their peers. Additionally, students <u>and</u> parent(s) will meet monthly as a group. Each gathering will build upon the important elements of starting the process of Jewish "adulting". Experiences will include in-house gatherings, field trips, and social action opportunities and time with Rabbi Rigler and Cantor Marx.

The strand that ties all of this important work together is a personal Torah project. Each family will meet with Rabbi Rigler to be introduced to and seek understanding of your child's Torah portion for their B'nei Mitzvah. Torah project presentations will be scheduled either mid-year or at the end of the year, depending on the date of their B'nei Mitzvah.

The sixth grade year is a time when all of pre-teens have a common goal...to become a B'nei Mitzvah. Often, thinking about this goal is not only how the adults in their life support them but their peers, as well. We want to provide opportunity for our 6th graders to gather as a social group where they can have fun and lean on each other during the pre-B'nei Mitzvah year.



#### Consecration

Our learners first steps into Jewish learning at Temple Sholom is a time for celebration! Consecration, a rite of passage for new students in Kindergarten through 5th gr. at Temple Sholom, publicly recognizes this commitment to Jewish life and learning. As students are welcomed onto our bimah they receive a special gift and blessing to commemorate this moment.

#### Fourth Grade Naming Service

Students in our 4th gr. Bet class have entered a new chapter in their Jewish journey. The first year of formal Hebrew education is a first step to becoming knowledgable participants in Jewish worship. This beautiful ceremony, unique at Temple Sholom, celebrates the beginning of formal prayer education while linking our learners to both past and future generations.

#### Sixth Grade "Move Up"

The end of the sixth grade year marks the beginning of a new and exciting step in a student's Jewish journey. During the seventh grade year many of our students will celebrate their B'nei Mitzvah. They will also become members of our high school Rimon Noar program leading them to Confirmation. As young adults in Rimon Noar (7th and 8th grade) students will build upon the lessons they learned in the early years and will become "prosumers" (producers and consumers) of their education.

#### B'nei Mitzvah

B'nei Mitzvah is a rite of passage for all young Jewish adults age thirteen or older. This beautiful and meaningful ceremony celebrates a student's first steps into Jewish adulthood. At Temple Sholom we encourage all of our students to take part in this life-cycle event by completing the requirements for a public ceremony which include enrollment in our religious school through the B'nei Mitzvah year and completion of our three-year Hebrew program along with Torah studies with Cantor Marx.

#### Confirmation

Confirmation is a **twelfth-grade** "coming of age" ceremony that celebrates a young adult's emergence into Jewish adulthood. Much more so than B'nei Mitzvah, the student who has continued their education is prepared to discuss, question, debate, and LIVE their Reform Judaism as they continue on to college and beyond. The bonding that occurs during this pivotal year creates life-long relationships that are evidenced during the beautiful Confirmation ceremony.

## Hebrew Kind. - 7th gr.



#### **Rimon Hebrew**

At Rimon, Hebrew learning begins in Kindergarten and continues through the B'nei Mitzvah year. Hebrew is the language of our people and the language of prayer. At Rimon, our goal is to guide your child to value the Hebrew language and, to value and engage in prayer (tefillah) in ways that are exciting and meaningful. To that end, we have designed a Hebrew program that touches the whole person: mind, body, heart, and spirit.

#### Kindergarten through 3rd Grade

Your child will spend their early years engaging with the sounds of the Hebrew language by listening, understanding, and doing (practicing) during the Sunday morning Rimon program.

#### <u>Hebrew Through Movement</u>

Based on best practices for ESL – (English as a Second Language) Hebrew Through Movement introduces your child to the <u>sound</u> of Hebrew while introducing them to everyday and holiday-related vocabulary. It is both engaging and fun for our learners! New vocabulary is added each year.

#### Age-Appropriate Prayer Experiences

Cantor Marx and our song leaders lead our Kindergarten – 3<sup>rd</sup> grade learners in age appropriate tefillah incorporating vocabulary from Hebrew Through Movement whenever possible.

#### Word of the Week and Letter of the Week

Each week a new letter is introduced and "posted" on an interactive Lego wall in the school hallway. Throughout the year, learners will have the opportunity to "build" a representation of something that begins with the Letter of the Week out of Legos.

Additionally, the Word(s) of the Week will be posted in the school hallway and introduced/used by the teaching staff whenever appropriate.



#### Rimon Hebrew Fourth, Fifth and Sixth Grades

Experience has proven that it is not the *length* of time but the *quality* of time that our learners engage with Hebrew that results in Hebrew mastery. Therefore, our mid-week Hebrew classes are 45 minutes with a choice of days and times.

#### 4th Grade - Bet

Hebrew Side by Side is a Hebrew curriculum based on the sound-to-print model of learning letters and vowels leading to decoding of words. Hebrew Side by Side is intended for your child to progress at their own pace along with one-on-one teacher support.

Learners typically complete the *Hebrew Side by Side* curriculum in late winter or early spring. They then move onto the Rimon- "Bet" book to begin engaging with Shabbat, holiday prayers and blessings, and learning to read and understand the message of each prayer and blessing.

#### Class-led Shabbat Service

4<sup>th</sup> graders will have the opportunity to lead a Friday night Shabbat service at Temple Sholom. The purpose for participation in this service is to build a comfort-level on our bimah with those in attendance.

#### Word the Week

Each week a new word is introduced having relevance to an upcoming holiday or to Judaic content. Words are posted in the school hallway and used in the classroom.

#### 5th Grade - Gimel

With a solid foundation of decoding skills your 5<sup>th</sup> grader will dive into Hebrew mastery of the *Shabbat* evening and *Shabbat* morning prayers and blessings while continuing to review holiday prayers and blessings. Hebrew mastery not only includes the ability to read or chant a prayer, but includes making personal connections to the prayers or blessings. What is the prayer about? How do I connect to the prayers or blessings and what do they mean to me?

#### Word the Week

Each week a new word is introduced having relevance to an upcoming holiday or to Judaic content. Words are posted in the school hallway and used in the classroom.

#### Class-led Shabbat Service

5<sup>th</sup> graders will again have the opportunity to lead a Friday night Shabbat service at Temple Sholom. The purpose for participation in this service is to continue to build a comfort-level on our bimah while leading the congregation in worship.

#### 6th grade - Gesherim

As a 6<sup>th</sup> grader, your child will review the prayers and blessings covered in 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> grades while taking a deep dive into the prayers of the *Torah* service. Along with learning to chant the *Torah* blessings and *Haftarah* blessings, your child will explore the rituals surrounding the *Torah* service.

#### Class-led Shabbat Service

6<sup>th</sup> graders will have their final opportunity to lead *Shabbat* services from our bimah. The importance of class-led services is to ensure that your child feels comfortable and "at home" on Temple Sholom's bimah. This is their bimah!

#### Word the Week

Each week a new word is introduced having relevance to an upcoming holiday or to Judaic content. Words are posted in the school hallway and used in the classroom.

#### 7<sup>th</sup> grade - Rimon Noar

As a 7<sup>th</sup> grader your child will begin the B'nei Mitzvah tutoring process under the direction of Cantor Marx approximately six months before their B'nei Mitzvah.

# Rimon Noar & JLF Teen Engagement 7th - 12th grades





Rimon Noar and JLF are all about relationships. These programs are where 7th-12th grade teens come together to share and continue their connections to Temple Sholom, their Jewish touchpoints, and their friends. Rimon Noar and JLF are designed to meet teens where they are.

Rimon Noar and JLF provide unique, innovative, and engaging opportunities. We want our teens to develop tangible life skills that will enable them to share their voices and passions as they continue to grow their individual and collective Jewish identity.

#### Why Teens attend Rimon Noar and JLF...

- Tikkun Olam a commitment to make the world a better and more just place through social justice and social action.
- Kehillah (community) being part of a supportive, accepting, and interdependent thinking community.
- Preparation building knowledge and skills to navigate the college years and beyond through Jewish values and the tools for ethical decision-making.

#### What will teens gain by attending Rimon Noar and JLF?

- Tangible Life Skills participation in Rimon Noar enables teens to practice important skills for college and beyond such as, public speaking, debate, and advocacy.
- Relationships- not only with other teens but with adults who they will see as mentors in their future endeavors.



#### 7th grade

During the first part of the year, 7th graders will explore the Holocaust through the lens of human behavior. Through film, primary sources, and discussion, learners will wrestle with important themes and issues. During the latter part of the year teens will choose their own path through electives.

#### 8th grade

During the first part of the year 8th graders will "meet" the Prophets and begin to develop their own thoughts on issues such as social justice and ways to impact their world. During the latter part of the year, teens will choose their own path through electives.



#### 9th - 12th grade

Jewish Leadership Fellowship (JLF)

JLF is a unique and powerful ten-month program for all 9<sup>th</sup> – 12<sup>th</sup> grade Temple Sholom teens. Led by Rabbi Rigler, teens will engage in social justice and advocacy, taking activism to the next level through study, immersive experiences, volunteering, and sacred partnerships. We will empower our teens to take leadership of our sacred heritage as they:

- Strengthen their own understanding of social justice and systems of oppression from a root cause perspective.
- Build leadership skills to organize for social change.

- Participate in hands-on community work with local organizations.
- Engage in active and unbiased listening, hearing the stories and struggles of those who we will encounter.

- Journey with us through TZEDEK AMERICA as we travel to Arizona and the Texas border. We will see first-hand what it means to come through immigration to the U.S. Speak with immigrants and interact with them. Teens will learn, explore, and find their own voice and inspiration to continue to create impactful change upon their return.
- Join teens from around the U.S. as we travel to Washington,
  D.C. for the RAC (Religious Action Center) L'Taken Teen
  seminar. This four-day experience immerses teens in exploring
  social justice issues that face us today. Finding their own
  passions and teens will have the opportunity to visit Capital Hill
  and share their voices.

#### The Madrichim Team



## Student and Parent Responsibilities

#### **Cell Phones**

Cell phones are a wonderful piece of technology that keep us connected to others. The use of cell phones can also be a distraction to learning. Therefore, cell phones are *not* to be used in the classroom by students *unless* the classroom teacher instructs students to use of the phones for educational purposes! If a student is using a cell phone to make a call, answer a call, text message, or play a game the teacher will take the cell phone and return it at the end of class. Keep in mind, especially when it comes to Hebrew, reinforcement at home makes all the difference!

#### **School Closings**

The decision to close Religious and/or Hebrew school is made jointly by the Executive Director and Education Director. This decision will be made by 7:45 am. on Sunday morning. Weekday closings follow the <u>Marple-Newtown School District</u> unless inclement weather begins later in the day. In the event of such a situation, the decision to close school will be made jointly by the Executive Director and Education Director. You <u>will</u> be notified in the case of inclement weather.

#### **Student Evaluation**

Temple Sholom faculty work hard at creating an atmosphere where children like being Jewish, have positive Jewish experiences...and succeed! We praise them, challenge them and encourage each child to work to their ability. We offer opportunities to learn new skills and explore ideas in a safe, yet challenging environment. If a child is experiencing difficulty, we will let you know. If a child needs extra attention, we will address each child and each situation on an individual basis. As Rimon is a partnership between the parent(s), teacher and child, we ask that you inform us of any difficulty you are seeing with your child.

Assessment of student progress is a combination of formal and informal assessment by the student and the classroom Jewish Learning Guide/Teacher. A "Progress Report" will be sent to <u>all</u> Hebrew students two times during the year...once in January and again in May. ALL learners will receive a cumulative Progress Report at the end of the year.

#### **Tzedakah**



Tzedakah (the opportunity to do righteous deeds for others) is actually a commandment. Through monetary contributions, non-perishable food items for the hungry, or clothing for the needy. Tzedakah is at the heart of Reform Judaism and at Rimon. We hope you will help your child participate. Tzedakah is collected during every Sunday and weekday session.
